Rev. Mr. Gordon's Pastorate

Rev. J. A. Gordon, in four years, inspired the church during its rebuilding experience so that it prospered and ninety members were added by baptism. Giving by church envelopes was adopted. Mr. George DesBrisay a generous supporter of the church and an efficient Sunday School teacher died in 1890. The church made progress in adding to its members and by reducing its debt \$1000.00 during the five year pastorate of Rev. C. W. Gorey. Mr. John Scott died November 1893. It was said of him that he lived a consistent, exemplary life and was always in his place at the services of the church. He was Deacon twenty-one years. Mr. Nathan Davies, clerk and deacon of the church for many years died in 1896. "The memory of the just is blessed." In March, 1898, Mr. DesBrisay died. He had been fifty-two years one of the most faithful and consistent members of the church. He served as treasurer 38 years; clerk 30 years; deacon 24 years and as Sunday School superintendent 22 years. When there was no choir he led the singing; when there was no preacher he read a sermon to the assembled congregation; and he abounded in every good word and work.

The choir of this Church has rendered faithful service through many pastorates. Two present tonight deserve special mention, Mrs. A. W. Sterns (Rebecca Scott) organist for many years and Mr. Howard Dingwell, now president and member of the choir for over 50 years.

Honour to Leaders
This church honours the leaders who faithfully served her and her country during the Great War and those who have supported her through the even more trying times of peace that have followed. Mr. A. W. Sterns died Feb. 19th, 1923. He was deacon 42 years, Treasurer 22 years, and Superintendent of the Sunday School for 21 years. His kindly helpful Christian spirit endeared him to all. Mr. Donald Nicholson, M. P. Chairman of the Trustee Board for many years, was always a most generous supporter of the church. Mr. Bruce Stewart could always be counted on when a need arose. Mr. A. F. Webster, deacon for 25 years, treasurer 4 years. Mr. E. D. Sterns, clerk, 40 years, deacon 2 years. Mr. J. K. Ross, deacon 27 years. Mr. George L. Simmons, deacon 5 years. These and others, and a host of noble, faithful women who have served their God through their ministrations and service, in connection with this church and His children, wherever they had an opportunity to help them in both spiritual and temporal matters, are gratefully remembered by us at this time. "Inasmuch as ye did it unto the least of these My brethren ye did it unto Me", the Master said: "By their fruits ye shall know them". These noble souls who loved their God and Church so well have passed from their labours here. May we, inspired by the faithfulness of great souls who helped to make the record of the past what it is, accept their challenge: "To you from falling hands we throw the torch—be yours to hold it high;" and with the Church face the future and the tasks it may bring with confident reliance on Him who said: "Lo I am with you alway."

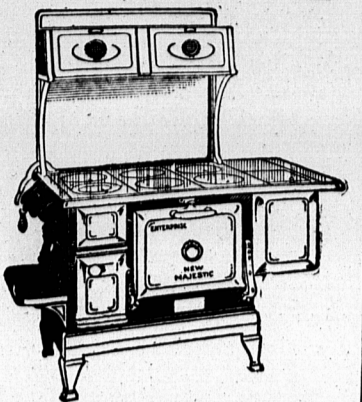
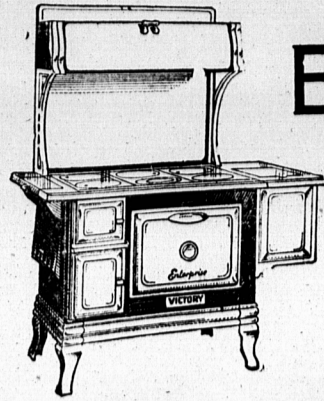
Pipe Organ Installed

Rev. Z. L. Fash who was greatly interested in the church music, was largely instrumental in enabling the church to install a splendid Cassavant Pipe Organ, which was formally opened December 12th 1911. Prof. Hiram Ball of Moncton playing. During his pastorate a committee was appointed to consider a union with the Central Christian Church. It did meet with a similar committee appointed by that church and a basis of union submitted to both churches. The basis of the proposed union was read to the church on March 19th, 1916 when the church was without a pastor. It was discussed by the meeting at length. No one spoke unfavorably. A resolution was adopted but was not entered in the minutes of the meeting. On May 3rd, 1916 the church extended a call to Rev. C. R. Freeman who came to the church as pastor July 1st, 1916. He had great organizing ability and strove to serve His Master in every walk of life. He was re-elected to serve a second term as President of the Maritime Baptist Convention and "Acadia" honoured him with the degree of D. D.

It is too soon to write of the valued services of Rev. Ross C. Eaton, B.A.; B.D.; and Rev. Arthur C. Vincent B.A., D.D., except to say that the church prospered under their care and large numbers were added to the membership. We most sincerely appreciated the kindly, fatherly, gracious services of Rev. Frank Bishop and wondered as he did why our Christian work had not converged before. He did us
