New Settlers For The Maritimes

(Special to The Guardian) MONCTON, N. B., May 25.—Not since the pioneer days of the settlement of the Maritime Provinces has there been such a steady and substantial flow of new settlers coming into these Provinces as at the present time.

The New Brunswick government scheme went into effect only the middle of April but within those few weeks over seventy families have been settled on farms in the Province and before the season is over the one hundred family allotment for the year will have been completed.

Last Saturday and Sunday the Canadian National Railways received the largest single group, fifty two Danish settlers including many young men arriving on ships at Halifax and brought to Moncton for allocation throughout New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

The Canadian National expect another contingent of Scandinavian settlers this week end at Halifax. There will be one group of fifteen young Danish men, all single, many of whom will go to Prince Edward Island, already placed in positions awaiting them.

Ships arriving at Quebec also have their selected families for the Maritime Provinces and the indications now are that this stream of immigration will continue until late in the season. The new settlers are being most cordially received by the people of the Provinces. Families on arriving at their new homes in a strange land will frequently find that their houses have been opened up by their future neighbors, fires burning, meals ready for them and every effort made to make them feel at home and ameliorate that loneliness and homesickness that it is natural man would feel.

Film 'Dawn' Barred From Australia

(Special to the Guardian) CANBERRA, May 25.—The much-discussed film "Dawn" has been prohibited from exhibition in Australia. That its showing would be especially inopportune in view of the movement to outlaw war was mentioned by Premier Bruce as one of the reasons why such action was taken. He said that a film representing a historical event the circumstances whereof had aroused deep feeling all over the world should not be shown unless the critical parts were substantially accurate. Two Aberdeen gentlemen were emerging from the theatre after a performance of "Hamlet." "Ay," said one in a thoughtful voice, "I admit I'm profoundly affected by that play. Wee-wee. It's as good as a sermon and it makes me think I ought to have done more during my lifetime." The other looked at his friend meaningly. "Ay," he said, and y-e-v-e-d a good few in your time too."
