Jack Dempsey To Quit Roped Arena, Is Report

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The heavyweight boxing situation took another turn today with reports flying fast establishing Jack Sharkey of Boston, as the next opponent for Gene Tunney, while Jack Dempsey's retirement was foreseen. Behind this new phase of events was a report that Sharkey is still troubled with his hands and will seek another postponement of his match with Tom Heeney, down to Jan. 13 at Madison Square Garden. Tex Rickard emphatically denied Sharkey would be unable to go through with the Heeney bout. Nevertheless a feeling persisted in boxing circles that Promoter Rickard intended holding Sharkey as an emergency opponent to promote a "sure" Sharkey fight in Boston, where Rickard has completed arrangements to manage an indoor arena on the same plan as Madison Square Garden.

Detroit Players Traded To Boston

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The Detroit Tigers, through Manager George Moriarty, today announced first baseman Lu Blue, and outfielder Harry Manush had been traded to the St. Louis Browns for outfielder Harry Rice, pitcher Elam Van Gilder, and a third player to be named later. Moriarty refused to say whether George Sisler, famous first baseman of the Browns, would be the third player to be obtained by Detroit in the deal. Moriarty declared no cash was involved in the transaction. Manush, who has been with the Tigers five years, was batting champion of the American League in 1926, but dropped well down the list this year as his teammate Harry Hellman, won the hitting crown. Blue has served several years with Detroit and ranked among the leading first sackers.

Famous Archaeologist Canadian Born Lad

DR. GEORGE BYRON GORDON, F. R. G. S., OF THE UNIVERSITY OF PENNSYLVANIA WAS A NATIVE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.
Recent revelations in Central American archaeological remains recall to mind the fact that a Canadian, Dr. George Byron Gordon, F. R. G. S., who died early this year in Philadelphia, was one of the most eminent investigators in that field and had published many books on the subject. It is singular that although his death won tributes to his services in the cause of archaeology from many publications on both sides of the Atlantic, Canada has remained for the most part in ignorance of the great part one of her own sons has played in the scientific investigation of pre-historic remains in many parts of the world. At the time of his death Dr. Gordon was Director of the world-famous Museum of the University of Pennsylvania and he had been in charge of the excavations of the late Theodore Roosevelt. At the close of the meeting he was seized with a heart attack and falling, fractured his skull, death ensuing in a few hours. His passing was a matter of great grief to his colleagues on the staff of the University of Pennsylvania, as well as to officials of many learned and public institutions, like the British Museum with which he had been intimately associated. One of his closest friends was another Canadian, the eminent sculptor, R. Tait MacKenzie, also on the staff of that University, and he was buried from the home of the ex-Provost of the University, and President of the Museum, Dr. Charles C. Harrison, a public tribute was paid by the present Provost, Dr. Penniman, to his achievements as explorer, anthropologist, archaeologist, author, teacher, and museum director. It was said of him after his death that he was outwardly a man of austere manner and few words, devoted entirely to his work, but his air of reserve was sometimes penetrated, especially when anything arose affecting the Museum, that was literally the apple of his eye.
