THE DEATH OF REV. DR. DOBSON

Rev. Dr. Dobson is no longer with us. Yesterday when the Sabbath dawned, the Sabbath that he loved, he was no longer conscious of things earthly. And shortly after the worshipping congregations of the morning had returned to their homes, in the hush and calm of the afternoon, the news spread about the city that his spirit had passed to the unseen world.

The first thought was one of irreparable loss and to the thousands who knew him there came a sense of deep personal bereavement. Great indeed is the loss. Within the charmed and loving circle of his home where the darkest shadow falls, in the church where he was greatly beloved and revered, in the pulpit which he so greatly adorned, in the higher councils of Methodism, in the wide circle of his friendship in many lands that loss will greatly felt.

Dr. Dobson possessed rare qualities of mind and heart that were recognized by all who knew him. As a preacher he was possessed of rare spiritual insight and a firm faith in the great verities of religion. Few speakers are gifted with such clear vision or so logical a mind, and still fewer could present their thoughts so clearly to the minds of their hearers. It was a great boon to Charlottetown and to this Province that he came to us in the fulness of his power and has given to the largest Protestant congregation in the Province the last and best years of his life.

His congregation here had long included many belonging to other creeds than his own. For many years past The Guardian had printed one of his discourses nearly every week, and Christians of all classes valued them most highly. Thus he spoke to many thousands outside the Brick Church from Sabbath to Sabbath and these will join with us and with the sorrowing church in deep regret that his pen has been laid down for the last time, and that his eloquent and moving voice is forever silent.

Space will not permit saying more, except this: A good man is gone from earth to higher activities beyond. He fought a good fight, he finished his course, he kept the faith. It is easy to believe that there is a crown for such a life.

The statement in The Guardian Police Court report of October 14 purporting to have been made by a witness in court to the effect that he obtained liquor from the Captain of the City of Ghent is emphatically denied by Capt. Hare. There seems also to be some contradiction as to what were the extra words of the witness. Those who know Capt. Hare best do not believe that he was in any way connected with the transaction in question.

The Patriot estimates the value of farm crops and products in this Province this year at \$8,750,000 of which field crops make up \$8,250,000 and half a million is added for dairy, live stock and fishery products. The estimate is not too high in the aggregate and it makes a fine showing, but we think our contemporary in estimating the oat crop at \$4,000,000, or nearly half the total, has rather exceeded its fair proportion, to the value of other crops and products.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper who for a number of years past has been a resident of British Columbia, has been nominated for the Commons by the Conservatives of Pictou. Sir Hibbert represented that country from 1888 to 1904 when he retired. At the general election of 1904 A. C. Bell was a Conservative candidate and was beaten by E. M. McDonald, with a majority of 432. It is reported that Mr. Bell is not very well contented at being passed over in favor of a non-resident, but on the other hand Sir Hibbert's fine ability and long and distinguished service are to be taken into account. He is undoubtedly one of the strongest men in the Conservative party of Canada and ought to be in Parliament.

HON. DR. PUGSLEY AND THE TUNNEL.

We before noted with pleasure the reference made by Hon. Dr. Pugsley to the Tunnel on the eve of his election in St. John. Speaking at Fairville on that occasion he brought under review a number of the great public works which were projected and seemed necessary, to which the Government must give attention in the near future. In the list he included the Tunnel under the Straits of Northumberland, and promised to look into the practicability and merits of that project.

On Friday evening last the Minister of Public Works was entertained at a banquet in Sussex, the commercial centre of Kings County, which county he has long represented in the New Brunswick Legislature, and in his address he again referred to this important work. He told those present that he had read the reports in his department on the Tunnel with great care and interest and while speaking candidly as to time and cost expressed his hope of yet inaugurating this great work, which would mean so much to the Island and to Canada. It is evident that he spoke with sincerity when he said "My sympathies go out to the Island people warmly and heartily."

The Minister was on a home ground, surrounded by the friends and associates of his early years. He was not bidding for the applause of the moment, as one might expect speaking on the subject in Prince Edward Island. This fact affords good evidence, if any were needed, of his sincerity. He was speaking as a Minister of the Crown, deeply interested in all that pertains to the welfare and advancement of Eastern Canada, and especially in matters affecting its transportation and trade. Doubtless, too, he has the spirit of forecast which has shown him the importance of associating his name with a work of such magnitude and which promises so great and beneficent results.

We may here recall that at the recent meeting of the Maritime Funeral Directors Association held in Charlottetown, it was Secretary F. W. Wallace, a Sussex man, who moved the resolution which was unanimously adopted by the Association, in favor of the Tunnel. Sussex is also home ground for the editor of The Guardian and it is therefore a source of personal as well as public satisfaction that Hon. Dr. Pugsley should there have publicly proclaimed his interest in and his sympathy with the hopes and aspirations of Prince Edward Island in this important matter.

The words of the Minister of Public Works will be read with pleasure and satisfaction by the people of Prince Edward Island and will give him a warm place in their hearts. They mark in a signal manner the growing conviction in the sister Provinces that the connecting link across the Straits is of vital consequence and must be supplied. They show, moreover, that in the hour of need the Island Province has found a strong, influential and capable friend at court.

On behalf of the Island people The Guardian tenders Hon. Dr. Pugsley very hearty thanks for his cheering words, coupled with the hope that his interest and sympathy may lead to practical results.
