DIPLOMATIC SITUATION IN VENEZUELA

Sir Robert Giffin Tells Why Germany

MAY DESIRE SOMETHING

Large in the Way of South American Territory—The Debt of Venezuela.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—Sir Robert Giffin, in the "Times" this morning points out some reasons why Germany might be found engaging in far more serious business than bombarding a Venezuelan fishing settlement. Sir Robert writes: "Even if the matter were patched up now, the general danger of the situation will remain. The Monroe Doctrine is a convenient one for the United States, and to some extent for this country. It suits us every way that the United States should cry 'Hands off!'"

"But the ideas and attitude of our European rivals themselves, of whom Germany is the chief one, are, naturally, not the same. Why, they may ask, should they be debarred from occupation and settlement because it is very convenient to the United States and little less so to England that they should abstain absolutely?"

"No good reason can be given them from their point of view, except force and that occupation and settlement in South America will not be worth their while at the cost of war with the United States, even if it could successfully be waged."

Here lies the danger. Some European rival, especially Germany, may be persuaded that the game of occupation and settlement in South America, even at the cost of war with the United States, is worth trying. The German government and people believe in colonies and possessions. They want a country for German settlement such as they would find in many parts of South America, particularly in Venezuela.

"As to war with the United States, which seems so atrocious to us as a species of civil war and so uncertain as to its result, looking at the population and resources of the United States, we must recollect that

the traditions of Germany are those of a military monarchy which has prospered by successful war, which has a stronger navy as far as numbers go than the United States possess, and an immense army, the United States having only a handful of soldiers.

"Suppose the German calculations should be that at the worst it would be impossible for the United States to do Germany any material harm, while Germany, if it beats the United States, will at once become the greatest naval power next to England.

"Who is to say the calculation is so wild that it may not be acted upon? "My own belief is that nothing will deter Germany from aggression in South America except the prospect of having England on its hands in a naval war as well as the United States, and that German diplomacy has contrived the present partnership with us in order to impede a possible alliance between us and that country.

"German diplomacy may perhaps be aiming at England even more than at the United States, for which purpose a breach between us and United States would be useful in order to prevent the United States from coming to our assistance.

"Our authorities should not be too confident that the possibility of a German coup d'etat against England may entirely be ignored."

In round numbers this debt amounted on Dec. 31, 1901, to something over \$13,000,000 and consisted of claims which had previously been adjusted. Since that date owing to the almost constant state of revolution which has prevailed in Venezuela, no payments have been made on the debt. Mr. Bowen's plan provides that thirteen per cent of the customs receipts of all the Venezuelan ports shall go toward the payment of this debt.
