The funeral took place Wednesday morning from the residence of Mr. Cephas B. Tweedy to the St. Joachim's Church and thence to the Roman Catholic Cemetery.

Mr. McMillan was a very friendly and genial man who had held the position of road overseer for some years.

"Three Wise Fools" Delightful Picture

A picture that will delight everyone who sees it opened a two days' engagement at the Prince Edward theatre yesterday. It is Goldwyn's first King Vidor production, "Three Wise Fools," fashioned by the director himself from the successful stage play by Austin Strong as produced in New York by John Golden and Winchell Smith.

The comedy-drama had a three-year run on the speaking stage. The screen version sets before the eye several important scenes that were just hinted at, or which took place off-stage, in the play version. One is a spectacular jail-break in which the heroine's father escapes with two other convicts who had staged the fight "The Jail Delivery" by a motor-car, is one of the most exciting sequences which we have recently seen.

The characters in the story have the feeling of reality and charm which they had in the spoken play. Eleanor Boardman plays the leading female role with exquisite charm and understanding. Claude Gillingwater, who acted the role of Findley in the stage version, has the same role in the photoplay and should see to it he is never allowed to stop acting for the films. He is one of the "three wise fools"; the other two are veterans of the stage, William H. Crane, and Alton Francis. They enlist the sympathies for the three old cronies who agree to take charge of the daughter of the woman they had loved in vain in their youth.

STRONG PLEA FOR ECONOMY AND RETURN TO HARD WORK

Able Address By Mr. H. D. McEwen, Veteran Member For Second King's, In the Legislature Recently.

Speaking during the Budget debate in the Provincial Legislature Mr. H. D. McEwen Second District of King's referred to some remarks of Mr. Blanchard the Liberal member for First Prince which he wished to answer. A great many people did not seem to know anything about King's, yet it is most interesting, historically and otherwise. He referred to what had been accomplished by Conservative Governments under Premier Matheson and Arsenault, to whose office he believed Premier Stewart to be a worthy successor. Under the Matheson Government the country had received its first real Prohibition law. Previous to that had been made a political football. The late Government carried on the Matheson Government policy and the present Government is also doing it. They were criticised during the election campaign for charging too much for whiskey; the Liberals were going to give the people cheap whiskey and lots of it. It is surprising today how many people button hole legislative members on the street corner and say: "Give us the Quebec law." Other people caution us to "stand pat." Another man will have another argument—so many people with different ideas about the Prohibition law. But if we had the Quebec liquor law here tomorrow who would pay all this money that would flow into the Government treasury? Some poor fellows who should be saving their money to feed their families. It is a strange thing about Prohibition, that a great many people who will vote for it, will take a drink or two behind the door when they get a chance. It was regrettable to learn that the Halifax fishing fleet is almost depleted by the traffic of Rum Row. It seems that the whole power of

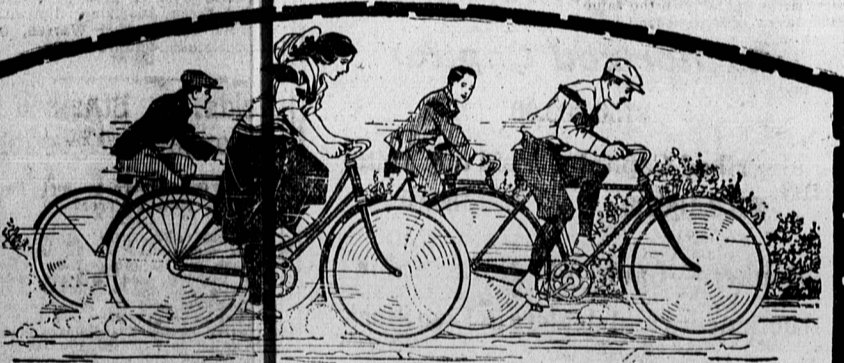
