Urges Canadian Lumber Dealers To Co-operate

QUEBEC, Nov. 14.—(C.P.)—Co-operation on the part of the Canadian lumber dealers with wood purchasers and lumber merchants of the United States under the "Lumber Code Authority" is urged in an official notice today by G. C. Piche, Commissioner and Secretary Treasurer of the Quebec Forest Products Commission. The notice draws attention of local dealers to the prices and other conditions laid down in the code, pointing out that it is essential for Canadian dealers to co-operate fully with the lumber code authority and also with the wood producers and lumber merchants of the United States. If they want to facilitate the exchange of forest products between the two countries.

STOWAWAY, DE LUXE, FINISHES TRIP IN BRIG

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Alfredo Garcia stroked his chin meditatively, noted the stubble growth of whiskers thereon, and decided to shave. That was his big mistake. Alfredo had embarked surreptitiously on the Colombian liner Colombia which sailed from Port Arthur for New York last Tuesday. In plain words, he was a stowaway, but by no means an ordinary stowaway.

Instead of skulking behind ventilators or hiding in the hold Alfredo occupied the de luxe suite of the liner. Finding the suite unoccupied he had walked in; and finding the accommodations much to his liking, he stayed in. With New York only a day's distance, Alfredo began to give thought to his personal appearance, he felt that as a traveller in the de luxe suite he should groom himself fittingly. That brought him to the matter of the shave.

To think was to act, he got out his razor and prepared to go to work, the suite was dark, so he reached over to turn on a light. He pressed the wrong button, instead of flooding the room with cheerful incandescence, he pressed a button that registered a signal in the office of the chief steward.

Garcia was found under the bed, his presence betrayed by a foot which he had neglected to haul in. The Captain sent the stowaway to the brig, whisks and all. When the Colombia sails from this port it will carry Garcia back to his starting point.

VETERAN RAILWAYMAN DEAD

PORT ARTHUR, Nov. 14.—(C.P.)—Jonh Ives McEwen, veteran railroader, who as conductor ran the first Canadian Pacific Railway train between Port Arthur and West Fort William, is dead here in his 71st year. He was born at Greenhill, Nova Scotia, and came West in 1880.

NEW CRUISERS PLANNED FOR BRITISH NAVY

British Admiralty Revises Naval Program in Line With Other Nations.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—The British Admiralty today announced revision of its 1933 naval programme to include two new type 9,000 ton cruisers with increased armaments and one cruiser of the 5,200 ton Arethusa class.

Sir Bolton Heredith Eyres Monsell, First Lord of the Admiralty, made a statement in the House of Commons. He said the decision was made after reviewing the latest cruiser programmes of other nations and "following the most anxious consideration and with much regret."

BANK CLERK IS ROBBED

CORNWALL, Ont., Nov. 14.—Victim of a surprise attack by armed hold-up men as he drove through a lonely swamp near Chesterville today, Thomas J. Bourke, 29, chief clerk of a sub-branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia at Norwood was robbed of \$1,500 of bank funds. Police from Cornwall, Morrisburg, Ottawa and Chesterville had found no trace of the robbers up to a late hour.

Bourke, a clerk in the Chesterville branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia, is in charge of the sub-office at Norwood, five miles distant. Late this afternoon he set out from Norwood to take to Chesterville about \$1,500 in cash. The money was distributed about his person and a part of it was contained in a satchel in the rear seat of the car. The road from Norwood to Chesterville lies through a lonely section of the country.

Record Apple Export Made

KENTVILLE, N. S., Nov. 14.—(C.P.)—New all-time record for apple exports from Port Williams, in the heart of the apple growing industry, was established today with the booking for shipment of 18,000 more barrels. This shipment will bring total seasonal exports to 312,000 barrels compared with the previous high mark of 284,000 barrels in 1929-1930.

Liquor Laden Yacht Libelled

HARTFORD, Conn., Nov. 14.—(A.P.)—The oil screw yacht Anna of New York, captured by the Coast Guard last month outside the three mile limit off New London, was libelled with its cargo today by George H. Cohen, Assistant United States District Attorney, on the ground the craft did not have the right to carry liquor.

Storm Brewing Along Atlantic

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—While wintry blasts raked Lakes Ontario and Erie, endangering shipping, the United States Weather Bureau issued warning of a storm brewing along the Atlantic coast.

AUSTRIA IS WARNED BY UNITED STATES

VIENNA, Nov. 14.—(A.P.)—The United States intervened informally in the Austrian situation today and warned the Austrian people, through Minister George H. Earle, that if they encourage anti-semitism they will lose American sympathy and help.

Conditions In Cape Breton Are "Best In Years"

SYDNEY, N. S., Nov. 14.—(C.P.)—Industrial conditions in the Cape Breton mining district "are the best in recent years" F. W. Gray, Assistant General Manager of the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation, said today. All collieries are working at capacity and large payrolls are being issued, he said, with fairly reasonable indications this resurgence will continue both in coal and steel this winter.

Rhodes To Open Winter Fair

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Finance, will fill two important speaking engagements in the near future, in Toronto and New York. On Nov. 22 Mr. Rhodes will open the Toronto Winter Fair and deliver an address, and on Dec. 7 he will go to New York to address the annual meeting of the Association of Life Insurance Presidents of North America.

Thomas Speaks On Migration

LONDON, Nov. 14.—(C.P.) Cable)—No settlers are likely to proceed to Canada in the near future, under the scheme of assisted community-settlement being actively promoted by Brig. Gen. M. L. Hornby of Lethbridge, Alta., it was stated in the House of Commons today by J. H. Thomas Secretary for the Dominions.

STORM WHIPS LAKES ONTARIO AND ERIE

One Vessel Sent to Bottom While Several Other Lake Craft Endangered.

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 14.—A gale from the north, carrying with it snow and lower temperatures cut across Lake Ontario and Erie last night, whipped the waters into a choppy vortex, left in its wake crippled and stranded lake-craft and sent one vessel, the tug Florence from Toronto, to the bottom of Lake Ontario.

Crew Escape

No lives were lost or reported endangered, the crew of the Florence having quit the storm-maimed craft as the chill lake waters closed about it. A crew of 25 men on the D. E. Callender, grounded off Long Point, Ont., were still aboard tonight waiting for the storm to abate.

From Erie, Pa., came word of two unidentified vessels in difficulties near that port. Definite information concerning them was, however, unavailable.

Halifax Boxer Remanded In County Jail

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N. B. Farmer Swindled By Fake Eye Operation

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 24.—Another instance of a swindle being perpetrated on a Westmorland County resident, similar to the fake operation performed on a Nova Scotian some weeks ago in which the victim was robbed of \$900, fee for the alleged removal of a cataract from his eye, has come to light. An elderly farmer of Shediac Cape, a retired resident who has been troubled with a cataract for some time, paid \$600 to an alleged fakir to have it removed. Details of the swindle are lacking, but it was said at headquarters of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police this morning that the incident had been reported to them and had occurred.

Clothing Caught In Revolving Power Shaft

Mr. Harry Leard Victim Of Severe Injuries To Which He Succumbed Four Hours After Accident At Crapaud Electric Plant.

Mr. Harry Leard, Crapaud, died at 3.45 yesterday afternoon in the Prince County Hospital from severe injuries about the head and chest received in the electric light plant at Crapaud of which he was manager. Mr. Leard was found by his son, John, about 11.45 yesterday morning in an unconscious condition with his clothing caught up in the line shaft of the power plant.

It is not exactly known what happened but it would appear that he reached over to oil the shaft and his clothing must have got tangled up in the spindle. The terrible condition of his injuries especially his feet, would indicate that he was revolving with the spindle for at least ten minutes before his son found him. One foot was almost severed and the other badly mutilated as each time his body went round his feet struck the stone wall of the building. Owing to his struggles the engine belt came off which brought the machinery to a standstill.

When the power stopped Mr. Leard's son, working in the adjacent saw mill which was run by the power plant, went over to the plant and found his father unconscious with the terrible injuries stated above.

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J. H. THOMAS ATTACKS FREE STATE ACTION

LONDON, Nov. 14.—(C.P. Cable)—In a tense House of Commons this afternoon the Republican Government of the Irish Free State was charged by J. H. Thomas, Secretary for Dominions, with a fresh repudiation of the Anglo-Irish Treaty. The Minister spoke carefully from a typewritten memorandum, declaring he was stating the view of the Government of the United Kingdom.

Dominion's Secretary Claims Interference Re Anglo-Irish Treaty of 1921.

The reference was to three bills passed by the Dail Eireann and now before the Free State Senate. These abolish the right of appeal to the Privy Council, transfer from the Governor-General to the Executive Council function of recommending monetary appropriations, and delete
