AN INSTRUCTIVE ADDRESS

Delivered by Prof. J. W. Robertson on General Topics of Interest.—Of Especial Interest to the Dairymen of P. E. Island.

SMITH'S FALLS, Jan. 12.—The convention of the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's association closed to-day. It was probably the most successful in the history of the association.

Prof. J. W. Robertson, Dominion dairy commission, was introduced as "the man who has made Canada famous by the work he has done for dairying."

He said that whatever good name has come to Canada has come through the ability of the man on the farm, in the factory and warehouse. A hundred years ago the United States had a smaller population than Canada has now. It never had better opportunities and not as good institutions, and he predicted that Canada would have 60,000,000 people a century hence, and their success would depend largely on the foundation laid within the next twenty-five years.

With the great difficulties the dairying interest has progressed in spite of them. The difficulties can only be overcome by good management. Knowledge and ability are required. A man may know a great deal and be very ignorant, a man may know little and have great ability. There is a decided difference between an intelligent dairyman and a capable dairyman. Knowledge must be put to the test and gain ability by practice.

The help given by the government has been along these lines. Any help which will develop intelligence and the love and the capacity to work is the help most desired. Intelligence, practical ability and co-operation were the factors resulting in the success of the dairying interests and the three means whereby progress can be made. He quoted statistics showing the growth of the industry in twenty years from three and three quarter millions to nineteen and three quarter millions of dollars.

Continuing, Prof. Robertson showed the growth of the butter and bacon industry in the last four years and other food products connected with dairying. Six big branches of food products grew from \$37,000,000 to \$67,000,000 since 1896.

Prof. Robertson advocated the holding of cheesemakers' conventions with a view to increasing the proficiency of the craft. Dealing with the necessity of the principles, Prof. Robertson illustrated with methods of land preparation, rotation of crops, etc., which would tend to the development of the dairying interests. The same intelligence applied to the selection of seeds was also shown to be the profitable course to follow. The same principle applies to the selection of cattle and other animals.

With regard to tuberculosis, Prof. Robertson said that consumption was a house disease and thrives in a dark room. The tuberculosis bacilli can't stand more than two hours of sunshine. In the butter trade there are many difficulties largely arising from fermentation, which sets in after the butter is made. The safety is in keeping the temperature down. Keep it in a room below 38 degrees.

He suggested the construction of such earth ducts, and a eowl on top, which would be turned by an ordinary breeze, and would keep the temperature down to the required point. Prof. Robertson, speaking of the transportation facilities, said the steamship men had reformed their methods of handling through the work of the department, but much remained to be done.

Prof. Robertson was loudly applauded at the conclusion of his able address.
