MISS KATHRYN DOROTHY GILLIS
 The death of Kathryn Dorothy Gillis, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Alex J. Gillis, Flat River, which took place in the Somerville, Mass., Hospital, on Sept. 19th, 1929, deserves more than passing notice. WORK PROGRESSING ON NEW CHURCH—The work on the new Roman Catholic Church on the corner of Bayfield and Queen Streets which has been going on for the last two months, is rapidly nearing completion, and will probably be finished by the middle of December. LORD'S SON WORKS AS INSPECTOR

Of Locomotives For The C. N. R.—In Business For Simple Reason That He Likes It.

TORONTO, Oct. 19.—The Canadian National Railways can boast of having a Lord's son working as a locomotive inspector. He is the Honorable Verney Braye, son of Lord and Lady Braye, of Rugby, England, who are at present registered at the King Edward Hotel, having come over to visit their son. The Hon. Verney Braye, who came to Canada six months ago and went into the C. N. R. shops early in life, displayed a penchant for mechanics and he is in the business for the simple reason that he likes it.
 Lord Braye is proud of his son, who has broken away from aristocratic family traditions and is eager to follow his natural bent. The son is 25 years of age. Before he came to Canada he served his apprenticeship with the great Crewe engine works.
 His work keeps him employed at all hours night and day. He is on the road at all hours, inspecting locomotives, gathering information and making reports. He is often on the job as early as six in the morning and sometimes works far into the night. There is nothing of the snob about the Hon. Verney Braye. He labors under the same conditions as his fellow workers, and he is content like the others with the accommodation of an ordinary boarding house.

Radio Tonight

MONTREAL, Oct. 20.—Keeping pace with other advances in radio within the Dominion, the Canadian National has developed plans for a high standard of broadcasting that has never been reached in this country, said Sir Henry W. Thornton, Chairman and President of the National system in speaking, this afternoon to an unseated audience which reached from the Atlantic to the Rocky Mountains on the occasion was the inauguration of the series of 25 concerts by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra which will be broadcast this winter by Canadian National Stations. Twelve stations whose call letters begin with "C. N. R." and two associated stations were linked in today's broadcast, which carried the programme from Moncton, N. B., to Red Deer, Alta., put on the air originally from Toronto. The concert was simultaneously broadcast from the other centres and the United States was brought into the chain by means of W. W. J. which picked up the programme and relayed it from Detroit.
 Sir Henry in Montreal spoke by telephone to Toronto. The Canadian National Network, which will now be in operation regularly include Moncton, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, (two stations) London, Winnipeg, Brandon, Yorkton, Regina, Saskatoon, Edmonton, Red Deer and Calgary. Vancouver will shortly be added.
 In this inaugural broadcast of the Toronto Symphony Series, Sir Henry said "we see the culmination of months of preparation and an event that symbolizes in itself one of the main purposes we hope to accomplish through the use of Radio." He welcomed the listeners in the United States and preferred to the Radio as another instrument toward the strengthening of that strong bond of sympathy which existed between English-speaking peoples and which the Rt. Hon. Ramsay MacDonald had contributed so much to recent days.

PREHISTORIC MAN'S FOOTPRINT DISCOVERED

BULAWAYO, Southern Rhodesia, Oct. 18.—(British United Press)—The discovery of what is believed to be the footprint of a type of prehistoric man hitherto unknown is reported by Professor Cipriani, of the Royal University of Florence, who has been making ethnological researches in South Africa.
 Professor Cipriani states that he has found on the bank of the Limpopo River the imprint of an enormous human foot, which suggests a man of huge stature with ape-like tendencies. He says it was made by the most primitive type of man yet discovered, probably by one that used the large stone hand axe found in the Rhodesian Transvaal.
 Geologists will shortly investigate the age of the rock in which the footprint was discovered.
 The type of "Neanderthal Man," remains of whom have been discovered in the Neanderthal cave near Dusseldorf, Germany, and other places, is believed to have existed during a culture tentatively estimated as extending from 40,000 B. C. to 20,000 B. C.

GHOSTS MOVE FURNITURE

BERLIN, Oct. 19.—(British United Press)—Ghostly happenings in a modern third floor flat in Charlottenburg are being investigated by the medical members of the Berlin Parapsychological (Psychic Research) Society.
 The occurrences recall the story of the spirit which troubled the family of the famous preacher, John Wesley, except that in this case they are attributed to a dead member of the family, a carpenter, and are especially associated with his niece, Lucy Regulski, aged 11, who was much attached to him.
 The parents of the child, who are Roman Catholics, reported the matter to their priest, who in turn asked the doctors for their opinion.
 Shortly after the uncle's death, when Lucy was ill in bed, objects in her room were suddenly shaken and moved. Books danced about on the wall, together with noises of carpentry. These grew louder when the girl's brother played a mouth organ.
 The family would refer to such events by saying: "He has been here."
