### Occupation Of Dusseldorf

PARIS, Mar. 18.—The decision of the London Reparations Conference regarding occupation of Dusseldorf and other German cities and the application of the Allied economic penalties on Germany was approved by the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon by a vote that practically was unanimous except for Socialists and Communists. The vote officially given was 491 to 66.

M. Lefebvre asked Premier Briand to accept the resolution calling for permanent Allied control of the manufacture of arms and munitions in Germany. The Premier said it was impossible to accept the proposal as such a body was not provided for in the treaty.

### TWO WOMEN HELD FOR BIG ROBBERY

CHICAGO, March 19.—Two women were being held tonight in connection with the \$1,000,000 postal robbery at Toledo, Ohio, last February. They are Mrs. Myrtle Le Mack, the wife of a man for whom the police are searching, and Mrs. Margaret Monroe, her sister-in-law.

### Eighteen indicted

TOLTDO, Ohio, Mar. 19.—Eighteen individuals two of them women were named in indictments returned by the federal jury here late today in connection with the robbery of the central post office, Feb. 17th, when five armed men held up three railway mail clerks and escaped with mail sacks containing more than \$1,000,000 in cash and negotiable papers.

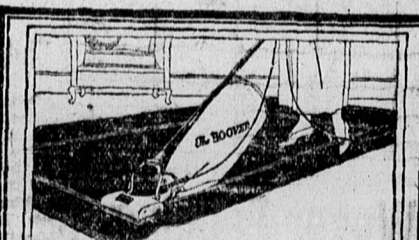

### Germany To Again Enter Entente

BERLIN, Mar. 18.—Dr. Walter Simons, Foreign Minister, speaking before the Committee of the economic council of the Reichstag today said: "We are pretty well agreed that sooner or later we shall again enter into negotiations with entente. I am of opinion our adversarial method of laying down figures as to Germany's capacity in the form of annuities for a long time beforehand will prove a failure. We must face the problem from another side, and place the work of reconstruction in the forefront of our proposals, at the same time formulating as comprehensive a plan as possible for the reconstruction of the devastated regions of France."
