She was a lady of exceptional mental endowment, well educated, well informed and a brilliant conversationalist. She had travelled extensively with her husband, and possessed to a more than ordinary degree the faculty of describing the places and scenes she had visited and the varied experiences of her travels. She took a keen interest in the social and civic life of the community in which she lived and in which she was a general favorite. Was born at Red Point, Dec. 7, 1895, baptized by the Rev. H. R. Bell into the fellowship of the Baptist Church Kingsboro in the fall of 1912. The fell disease of consumption all too soon manifested its presence in this young brother, and from the spring of 1915 he was noticeably worse. Slowly but surely the disease tightened its grip upon him, so that in spite of the most devoted nursing by his father and family, his spirit passed to the heavenly home Saturday, March 4th, 1916. A bright, intelligent young man, whose gentle, kindly ways endeared him to all. His influence upon others for good will long remain. His mortal remains were laid to rest on Monday, March 6th, the services being conducted by his pastor Rev. W. E. Piper.
