Cubs Within One Game Of Giants As New Yorkers Divide Games With Pirates

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 12.—After yielding to Larry French's southpaw slants in the first game of a double-header here today, the Giants concentrated their hitting in the second and gained an even break with Pittsburgh. French's six-hit hurling gave the Pirates a 3-1 decision in the opener. With Carl Hubbell on the hill, the Giants slammed out an 11-1 triumph in the second game. The split programme cut a half game from the Giants' National League lead as Chicago's Cubs won a single contest from Boston and wound up just one game to the rear.

Yankee Far In The Lead

I., July 12.—Yankee whipped Westmore and Vanitie took the measure of Rainville today in trials to select a defender of the America's Cup against the British challenger, Tom Sopwith's Endeavour. Yankee's victory places her far out in the lead in the competition and left her undefeated by an eligible opponent. Yankee led Westmore, Frederick Prince's candidate, home by three minutes 12 seconds after sailing a 22 1/2-mile irregular triangle. Rainville today showed herself on almost the same footing as discarded Vanitie. Vanitie held her on approximately even terms throughout the 22 1/2-mile course. At the finish the lately launched Vanderbilt boat followed Vanitie across the line by a minute and 18 seconds.

Nova Scotia Boy Only Maritimer Left In Running

Gerald Farren, Saint John Boxer Receives Great Ovation On His Courage.

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, July 12.—Gerald Farren, Saint John's 112 pound champion the only Maritimer to advance to the second round in last night's preliminary round of the Canadian Trials for the British Empire Games, was eliminated in the semi-finals tonight by Jim Armstrong, lanky Torontonian. Farren gave a great display of courage to go the limit with streaming blood from cuts on the head and face and staged a last round rally that brought the crowd to its feet. Armstrong had too long a margin, however, and although he lost the final round he was never seriously threatened. The crowd cheered Farren for minutes when the Easterner left the ring. He had given a great display of courage.

Fred Farren, brother of Gerald, also suffered elimination when he ran up against Doug Marsh, Montreal, runner-up for the Quebec provincial champion, in the 118 pound class. Farren was at no time in the running as the speedy Marsh danced around him flinging long lefts and rights to the face and head.

McTague's Single In Ninth Gives Cubs 5-4 Victory

Mass. Crews To Match Tacks Today For Prince Of Wales Yachting Trophy

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) YARMOUTH, N. S., July 12.—Youthful Massachusetts yachsmen representing the Vineyard Haven and Beverly Clubs will match tacks tomorrow in the final series of races for the Prince of Wales Trophy, emblematic of the junior yachting supremacy of North America.

Sailing their 15-foot sloop over the choppy water of Lake Milo today, the Vineyard Haven crew, F. B. Jewett and Theodore Robie, entered the final by eliminating the Richard P. Potts crew of the Corinthian Yacht Club, Marlborough. The Beverly crew from Marlborough, Hoyt Watson and Loring Reed, advanced by defeating Frank Montgomery and Robert Kirkland of the Quincy Yacht Club of Quincy, Mass., in two straight races. Canada leads her crew of bringing the trophy back home this season when two young girls from the Acadia Club of Yarmouth, Edith Chipman and Hazel Critcher, were eliminated yesterday by the Quincey crew. Previously the girls had ousted the only other Canadian crew, from the Royal Kennebecis Yacht Club of Saint John.

The final series tomorrow will be lengthened to five races. Vineyard Haven is favored to win, possibly because of the superior Junior National Champion of the United States. Before sailing in the semi-finals today, the Quincy crew won a protested race to eliminate Jack Hays and Peter S. Lang of the Plover Club, Marlborough, Mass. Quincy defeated them last week by taking two out of three races in a second round series but Plover protested and a fourth race was scheduled for today.

In first section consolation races today, the Manchester crew from London, Mass., won the first, for comfort, shooting. Eastern Marlborough third and the Acadia girls fourth. The girls protested the race on the grounds that skippers had been changed on one craft and that had been a failure to yield right of way. Plover, Royal Kennebecis and Quincy will start in the second section consolation series.

Big Matches Start Today

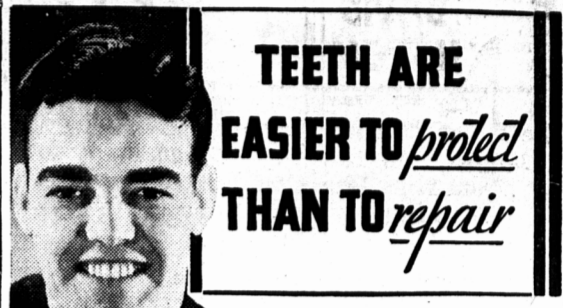
FORMER ROYALTY NOW IN HOTEL BUSINESS

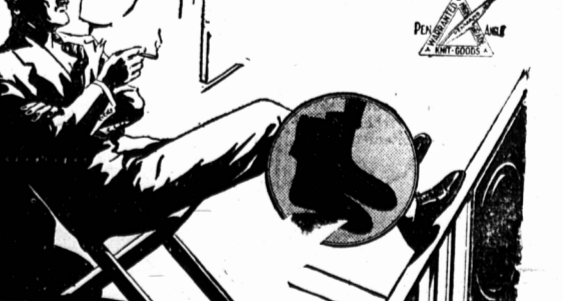

FRANCE LEFTS LUXURY TAX
