THE Royal Route to the Highlands is by steamer from Glasgow to Ardrishaig, passing through scenery of the most varied description. Leaving Rothesay she turns northward, passes Chapel Hill on the left, sweeps round Ardbeg Point and passes Kames Bay, Port Bannatyne and Kames Hill. On the right is Loch Striven, Colintraine, Loch Ridden, then Tignabraich is reached. Rounding Ard Lamont, Point Loch Fyne is entered and Tarbet is the next pier. Leaving this favorite resort you pass on the left Barmore Island, Stonefield House surrounded with woods and farther up Inverneil. The upper reach of Loch Fyne now open before you, the white walls of Lochgilphead gleam in the distance and soon the steamer is drawing up at Ardrishaig Quay. You now take the Canal steamer to Crinan, where you re-embark for Oban. The coast along which you sail is the land of some of the Scottish Clans and should you attend the Burn's Concert on next Friday evening, in the Opera House you will see many of their descendants at the grand reunion of the sons and daughters of Bonnie Scotland and their friends, being the first of the New Century, as well as the Boys' Highland Brigade (the little Gordons) in Kilts and Filibeg.


