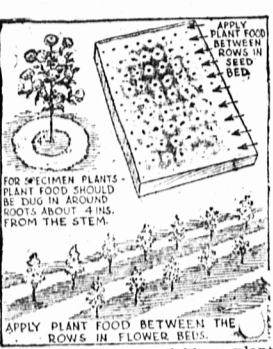

PLANT FOOD INTENSIFIES FLOWER COLORS

The spring flowering bulbs, herbaceous perennials, annuals and roses all benefit from a regular feeding program. Here is a feeding schedule to remind you when to feed your flowers.

THE COOK'S CORNER

HERE'S HOW TO USE EGG YOLKS FOR A NUT CAKE FILLING

When egg yolks have been used for cake the whites may be used immediately to make a toasted nut filling for the cake. Here is the recipe:

TOASTED NUT FILLING.

3-4 cup brown sugar
1-2 tablespoon water
3-4 cup nut meats, toasted and coarsely chopped
1-3 cup butter
3 egg yolks, slightly beaten

ROAST VEAL, TURKEY STYLE.

Five pounds veal from leg, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon brown sugar, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 3 tablespoons vinegar, 1 cup hot water, 6 slices bacon.

SCOTCH PATTIES

One pound lamb shoulder, 1 cup raw carrots, ground, 1 egg, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1 small onion, chopped.

teaspoon to one square foot of space surrounding plant.

Keep away from stalk of plant and work into soil. Repeat application when buds start to appear. Established perennials: Such as iris and peonies. Feed in early spring before plants appear, broadcasting plant food on the surface of the soil at the rate of one rounded tablespoonful to the square foot of space. It plants have already made their appearance, keep plant food away from the new shoots. Water in well. Give a second feeding when the buds appear.

Roses: Fed in the early spring, at the rate of one rounded tablespoonful to each square foot of space around the bush. It is important that this first application be made as soon as the roses start growth. When the first color shows in the buds, make a second feeding of half this quantity. Feed every 30 days until the middle of August.

Annuals sown directly in beds: Prepare the seedbed thoroughly and apply four pounds of complete plant food to the 10 square feet of surface area. Rake this lightly into the soil, mixing well, before sowing seed. When buds appear, feed again, giving half this amount.

Annuals transplanted from flats or cold frame: You may apply the plant food when preparing the bed, as directed above when the annuals sown where they are to remain; or you may mix thoroughly one level tablespoonful of complete plant food with the soil in the bottom of the hole, before setting out the plant. Feed again when buds appear.

400-deg. F. oven. Brown quickly.

Remove from the oven and rub the meat with the sage, salt, mustard, brown sugar and pepper mixed together. Mix the vinegar and water and pour into the pan around the meat. Lay the fat bacon strips across the top and cover the roast. Return to the oven, reduce the heat to 300 degrees F. and continue baking about 2-1/2 hours longer. Baste frequently with the liquid that is in the pan. Either hot or cold, this tastes very much like turkey.

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Share into cutlets, dip in beaten egg and cracker crumbs and fry in a small amount of hot shortening until well browned.

Cover and cook slowly for about 15 minutes longer. Remove from the pan and add 2 tablespoons flour to the fat in the skillet. Brown well and add water to make a smooth gravy.

Dorothy Dix's Letter Box

Burn Your Diaries Before You Are Married and Then Forget All That Was in Them if You Want Peace and Happiness in Later Life

Dear Dorothy Dix—A young man and a young woman, even before they met, each kept a diary into which they wrote not only what they did, but also their innermost thoughts. These two fell in love. Each revealed to the other many intimate truths, but there are still other truths, even more intimate which they wrote into their diaries. Before marriage, and in the cause of honesty as well as a distaste for the hypocrisy so destructive of later happiness, should they show each other their unexpurgated diaries?



Answer: I can think of nothing else on earth that would furnish food for so many quarrels, inspire so much needless jealousy and lead to so many criminations and recriminations as for a husband and wife to have before them in black and white a written transcript of everything that each of them had done, said and thought over a period of years.

Not even an angel could come through such an ordeal unscathed, because in addition to what was set forth the imagination would get in its deadly work and turn any inconsequent action into damning evidence of misdoing.

Keeping a diary is a dangerous and pernicious practice that can lead to much trouble, as we have all seen in some recent court cases. Even among people who lead less lurid lives than cinema stars it is a bad habit in which it is unwise to indulge.

There are many reasons for this. One is that it records many things that had best be forgotten. Another is that it is a temptation to us to snoop over, get maudlin and introspective, tell things about ourselves that are as much a lack of decency and reserve as it would be to strip ourselves and run naked down the street.

Somehow when we sit down with a clean white page before us a good pen and a full bottle of ink, we can't resist dipping deeply, as Sentimental Tommy did in Barrie's story, and imputing to ourselves motives that we really did not have, describing heart-throbs that we never experienced, growing emotional over men and women that we barely liked and depicting our hearts as being torn by grand passions that we never felt.

A diary that merely sets down the actual occurrences of a day is a valuable reference book, but one that goes into self-analysis and purports to be not only a record of one's acts, but also of one's feelings is dynamite that will blow any home to pieces. I earnestly recommend any young couple who have been guilty of the folly of keeping a diary to burn it before they are married. Otherwise they will never hear the last of that blonde girl you were so crazy about or that handsome young man you met in Europe.

A lot of men and women think that before they are married they should tell each other everything they have ever done. This is a great mistake. It does no good for a girl to tell the man she is going to marry how much she used to be in love with another man. It only fills him with suspicion and jealousy. It does no good for a man to tell the girl he is engaged to about his past indiscretions. It only gives her a knowledge with which to torment herself.

Unless there is something in the past of a man or woman that could reach out after their marriage and injure the wives and husbands there is no reason why they should "confess" episodes and adventures that are closed and done with.

Every bridegroom and bride should burn their diaries and love letters on their wedding eve and take a solemn vow never to mention again their previous conquests.

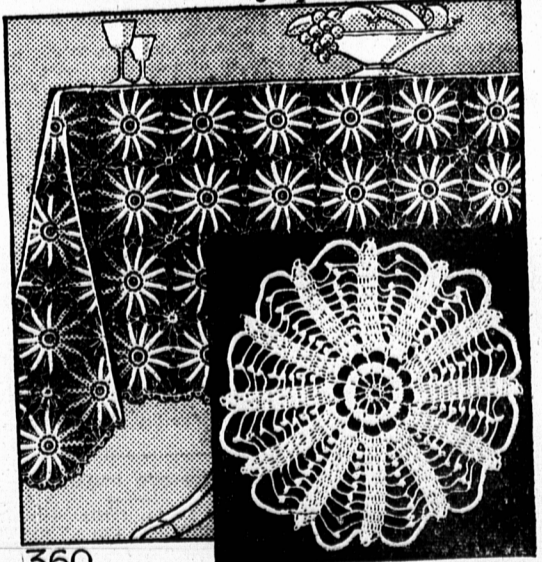
Dear Miss Dix—How can a girl tell when a boy loves her?

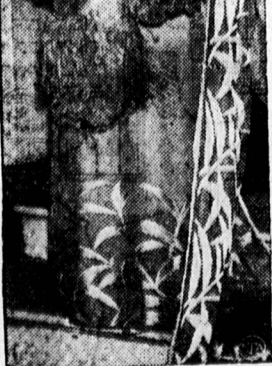
