PIRE WHICH ORIGINATED IN THE "PICKER" MACHINE

A fire, which originated in the "picker" machine, caused damage estimated at over \$40,000 at Landriani's Woolen Mills yesterday afternoon. The fire started at 10 o'clock and spread so quickly that when the firemen arrived smoke was pouring from the windows of the four story wooden building. Four streams were laid from the pumper at the fire. The fire was under control; the "all out" was sounded at 10 o'clock. Mr. William Condon, successor to Mr. Landriani, stated that the machine had been working for some time since July 1. About \$10,000 worth of yarn and blankets were almost completely destroyed. The machinery valued at \$30,000 is a total loss from water damage. The fire did not reach the first floor where the most intricate and expensive machinery is located, the tons of water, which poured upon them, causing warping of the wooden parts, and rusting of the metal parts, render these machines practically useless. About \$14,000 insurance was carried. It is supposed that a nail in the wool going through the "picker" caused a spark which resulted in the disastrous fire.

STARCH FACTORIES BUYING POTATOES

The three starch factories at Murray Harbor, Hunter River and St. Peter's are buying approximately between 5000 and 6000 bushels of potatoes per day, paying from 12c to 15c per bushel at the factory according to the starch content. It is estimated that three factories will use 225,000 bushels during the months of October and November. An order for starch was received from one of the large cotton companies which will fill 80,000 bushels to fill. The cotton factory is enabled to do this through the protection which the industry receives against foreign competition.
