NEWFOUNDLAND AND CANADA.

The rather important announcement is made by Premier Bond of Newfoundland now in London, that if advantageous term of union are offered by Canada he will lay them before the people of the Ancient Colony and if necessary exert himself to bring confederation about. There is little doubt that the present generation will see the union effected. It has been the dream of Canadian statesmen ever since and indeed before the Dominion of Canada was set up. The late Sir John Macdonald although failing in first and subsequent efforts to that end, almost to the last cherished the hope of seeing in his own day the Dominion rounded out by the inclusion of Newfoundland. The original scheme of Canadian federation included the Island Colony, and it has been the earnest desire of successive Imperial Governments to see that end effected.

Sir Robert Bond stipulates for "advantageous terms," and it is to be observed that it has all along been mainly a question of terms that has kept Newfoundland aloof. The terms first offered so long ago as 1863 were, indeed quite as favorable for Newfoundland as they were for Nova Scotia, New Brunswick or Prince Edward Island. But they were not really good enough. New Brunswick rejected the terms of the Quebec Scheme, and a year later accepted the better terms embodied in the British North America Act. P. E. Island then held aloof, and it is beyond question that the people of Nova Scotia, had they been consulted at the polls instead of being legislated into the union, would not have consented to the union of 1867. In the course of events which followed in the earlier years of the Dominion the people of Newfoundland have had at least some reason for not accepting the first proposals of union made to them.

They have seen the Maritime Provinces of Canada, themselves accustomed to very low tariffs before the union, clamoring desperately for better financial terms and chafing under the high protective tariff which the large and populous inland Provinces imposed upon them. And one after another Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island have succeeded in wringing some financial concessions from the central Government at Ottawa. Beyond question Newfoundland can get better terms now than she could have obtained in 1866, or probably at any time since, and equally beyond question she will demand better terms. The national debt of Canada, now over \$50 per head; the high tariff compared with Newfoundland's hitherto moderate customs rates; the vast annual expenditures made and making by Canada in the great west, are all so many reasons why Newfoundland will stipulate for and be entitled to receive generous financial terms if she shall consent to unite with us.

But Newfoundland is also in different circumstances from what she was when the previous negotiations for union took place. She has constructed an important railway, dock and other public works which have involved a heavy addition to her public debt. A higher tariff has become necessary in order to defray increasing interest charges. Moreover she has been checkmated in regard to the Bond Blaine reciprocity treaty with the United States and has learned that Canada must be reconciled with before the Imperial Government will consent to her making arrangements with the Republic in regard to a market there for her staple fish products. These and other matters are turning the attention of the public men and people of Newfoundland anew to the question of union. It is therefore quite within the bounds of possibility that terms fair to Canada and yet advantageous to Newfoundland may yet be considered and agreed upon, and that a new Province may be added to the Dominion under the regime of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. If it should so turn out, P. E. Island would most warmly welcome the larger sister Island to the union. Her accession would be of distinct advantage to our

trade, and would help to strengthen the all too weak maritime contingent in the national councils at Ottawa.

**FALL OF THE CAMPANILLE.**  
VENICE, July 15.—It is suggested that the constant dredging at the entrance to the Grand Canal and at the Island of Giudecca, in order to permit the entrance of larger ships caused the earth to slip and that the fall of the Campanille may be followed by other collapses.

**MINISTER TO SPAIN.**  
LONDON, July 15.—The Pekin correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphs his paper that Sir Liang Chen Tung, whose appointment as Chinese minister at Washington, has been announced, has been named also as minister to Spain and Peru.

**BAPTIST CENTURY FUND.**  
ST. JOHN, July 15.—Rev. H. S. Adams, who is canvassing for the Baptist century fund of \$50,000, reports that he has pledged for \$25,000, of which \$12,000 was subscribed in Nova Scotia; \$12,000 in New Brunswick, and \$1,000 by six Baptist missionaries in India.

**FRASER RIVER SALMON FISHING.**  
VANCOUVER, July 15.—Salmon fishing on the Fraser River commenced this morning, the canneries and fishermen having come to terms. Three thousand boats will be operated and the minimum price for the fish will be 11 cents with a maximum of 20 cents, the price being based on the size according to size of catch.

**RECOGNIZES THE BROTHERHOOD.**  
WINNIPEG, July 15.—It is stated that the Canadian Northern Railway management has agreed to recognize the United Brotherhood of Railway Employees, including engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and telegraphers and all to be done now is to sign schedules, which have been arranged.

**THE PANAMA CANAL.**  
COLON, July 14.—General Salazar, who is a staunch friend of the United States and one of the leaders of the young progressive element in Colombia, believes that the Panama Canal will be approved.
