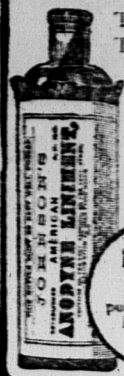

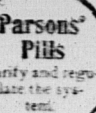

### INCREASE OF INSANITY IN UNITED STATES

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—"Cut out the use of alcohol, don't sow any wild oats, live in the country, if not all the time as much of the time as possible, and you will never go crazy." Reduced to simple forms that was the advice given by eminent alienists and neurologist at the first meeting in the campaign for the prevention of insanity held at the Academy of Medicine, No. 17 West Forty-third Street.

The meeting was under the direction of the Committee on Mental Hygiene of the State Charities Aid Association, which has been spreading the gospel of right living to the people of New York State. Some of these facts brought out at the meeting relative to the increase of insanity evidently startled many members of the audience of 200 which had assembled.

Dr. Albert Warren Ferris, President of the New York State Commission in Lunacy, said that out of a total population in the State of 9,117,275 in 1910, the number of known insane persons was 32,459. Dr. Ferris said further that while the increase in population since 1890 had been 47.6 per cent, the increase in the number of crazy persons had been 180.9 per cent.

Dr. Ferris declared that one out of every 279 persons in United States is insane—not just eccentric, but plain loony—and has to be restrained in the State institutions. "The first great cause of insanity," he said, Dr. Ferris, "is alcohol. The next in importance is the 'sowing of wild oats' by the young, which results in disease which causes insanity. It is a matter of record that 35 per cent of the cases of lunacy in our hospitals result from the use of whiskey or other spirituous liquors."

Dr. M. Allen Starr, professor of neurology in the College of Physicians and Surgeons, said:

"It is perfectly possible to control many of the external causes of insanity. There is a remedy for the insanity of the city type. That comes because we live too fast, we work too hard, we strive intensely and we feel too keenly."

"A comparison of the types of insanity that prevail in the city and the country is interesting and instructive. The types prevalent in the city are paresis, alcoholic mania and the insanities due to overwork and emotional strain. These are the most difficult to cure. The types met with in the country are mild melancholia and senile insanity. The first may easily be cured, and the last never comes until the victim of it is very old and has practically finished his life."

"The monotony of existence that in some cases causes the insanity of the country will cure the insanity of the city. It is evident, therefore, that if the conditions of country life can be produced in the cases of persons on the verge of mental breakdown in the city, some of the worst cases of insanity can be prevented."

"When you fear that your brain is giving out, spend as much time as possible among the hills or the hills. See that your vacation is as long as possible, and you will be comparatively safe from the insanity brought on by the conditions of city life."

### NEWFOUNDLAND NOT HAPPY.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Jan. 5.—Premier Sir Edward Morris left here last night for Washington, where he is to confer with Secretary of State Knox, James Bryce, the British ambassador and Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, minister of justice for Canada, regarding certain modifications of the Newfoundland-Canadian fisheries laws to which American fishermen have objected. The method of settling the questions at issue has been proposed in order to avoid the necessity of convening a special tribunal to decide the matter as ordered by the recent Hague conference.

### RUNS 1000 MILES IN 1000 HOURS.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5.—With hundreds cheering his wonderful sprint around twelve laps which remained to complete his task, Eugene Estoppy, ran a thousand miles in as many consecutive hours at midnight, establishing a new endurance world record. He started at ten o'clock in the morning of November 29. Ten days later the runner showed unmistakable signs of fatigue and was urged to quit. But by perseverance Estoppy plunged along to his second wind. His finish demonstrated wonderful endurance. He actually ran a mile each hour since he started, getting meals and sleep between miles. Estoppy's reward consists of a \$1,000 purse and his expenses.

### PRINTING BUREAU EMPLOYEES.

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.—The Secretary of State will at the present session of Parliament introduce a Bill placing all employees of the Printing Bureau in the outside service on the same footing as Letter Carriers.

### Public Notice

As measles seem to be getting prevalent in the schools of Charlottetown owing to the neglect of some citizens, Public Notice is called to the Regulations of the Board of Health, especially to Rules 1 and 6.

Rule 1 states that any householder in whose house occurs a case of measles shall immediately notify the Board of Health, through its Health Officer or secretary, of the same.

Rule 6 states that no member of any household where measles exists shall be permitted to mingle with children in schools, churches, or other public places.

There is a penalty of \$40.00 for failure to obey the rules. The Board of Health requests all citizens to comply with the regulations at once, and assist in stamping out the disease.
