The Dominion Atlantic Railway has issued a beautifully illustrated and handsomely gotten up booklet, descriptive of Nova Scotia, one of the cool and beautiful lands, of summer rest. The booklet throughout is very interesting and attractive and should prove a strong attraction in bringing tourists to this favorite holiday resort, which is as served by the magnificent steamers of the Company plying between Digby and St. John and Yarmouth and Boston.
