ENCOURAGING NEWS.—The following telegram was received yesterday by Col. S. R. Jenkins, from Capt. A. M. Plumtree.—"Following cable received from Commissioner overseas, Capt. Law, assistant Commissioner France, reports that our advance stores were moved with the corps to the new battle front near the first main station and that all necessary comforts were there. When the wounded started to come in that owing to the nature of the battles he has had some difficulty in keeping track of the field ambulances, but that they have all been visited as often as possible. He speaks in the highest terms of the work done by his staff and transports and at the time of writing he had not an unfilled request for supplies."

COMMUNION SERVICES.—The regular annual communion services of the Hartsville Presbyterian church were held on Sunday last. The day was delightful and the congregation was unusually large. At 11 a.m. the English service was held in the church and was conducted by Rev. R. H. Stavert, assisted by Rev. D. M. Matheson of Stellarton, N.S. At the same hour Rev. A. D. McKenzie of Montreal conducted the Gaelic service in the public hall near by. The main part of the church was crowded and a large number in the gallery. The public hall was well filled with those who enjoy the Gaelic service. At 5 p.m. the church was crowded throughout. Rev. D. M. Matheson preached and was assisted in the service by Rev. R. H. Stavert and Rev. A. D. McKenzie. Six members were received on profession of faith. Quite a number of friends from Charlottetown and surrounding districts were present at the services. The pre-communion services began on Wednesday evening and were held both morning and evening on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. The last service of the series was held on Monday at 11 a.m. In all of the services the pastor was assisted by Rev. A. D. McKenzie and Rev. D. M. Matheson.

NEW POTATO BUG EXTERMINATOR.—A Cariboo farmer tells us, says the Pictou Advocate, that he has not been bothered by potato bugs this year. He says that in the fall when cleaning up the fields he puts a little pile of small potatoes here and there and in a few days on turning over the pile, he finds great numbers of potato bugs. By this simple stratagem he clears the field of bugs in the fall. If there are any left for the Spring he takes a bag full of hens and dumps them in the potato field. The hens gobble up the bugs and are so keen for them that, the second day they find the way to the potato field themselves.

S. S. CONVENTION.—The annual convention of the Sunday Schools of South West Queen's District was held in the Long Creek Baptist Church on August 15th. There were sessions at 7 and 8 p. m. The President Mr. Hector Murchison performed the duties of Chairman. In the unavoidable absence of the Secretary Miss Ret. Cruwys, Rev. J. Heaney acted as Secretary. After devotional exercises led by Rev. A. Hurn the minutes of last convention were read and approved. The reports from officers who were present were then received. The following were appointed as nominating committee: Mr. Hugh McMillan, Mr. Harry M. Hyde, Mrs. W. Stretch, Rev. A. Hurn and Rev. J. Heaney were appointed committee on resolutions. Rev. W. A. Ross the able and efficient field secretary gave an address on Sunday School standards and chartered the school on the basis of the reports. This was followed by discussions of plans and problems. The evening session was opened with devotional exercises led by Rev. A. Hurn. The report of the Resolution Committee was also adopted and included a resolution conveying to the friends of Long Creek, who entertained the delegates, the thanks of the Convention and to the General Secretary and retiring officers; also a resolution urging upon all the schools in the District the desirability of keeping before them during the year the ideal school as it is put before them in the standards for Sunday Schools. Rev. Mr. Ross then gave an excellent address on the "value and view of Religious Instruction." The National Anthem brought the convention to a close.

NEW YORK'S FUR MARKET REPORT

Since our last report, conditions in the Fur Market throughout the country have undergone the usual comparatively dull spell incident to the early Summer days. There has been a considerable renewal of activity, however, during the past two weeks, stimulated to some extent by the successful special August sales conducted by most of the leading retail stores from coast to coast. These sales, which appear to have become a permanent feature of the Market, have tended to advance the season both for the dealer and the manufacturer. All our reports indicate that the principal articles which have entered into actual consumption at this time at full prices are Muskrat (both natural and dyed), Skunk, the better grades of Mink, Sable and Marten of all kinds, Foxes, Lynx, Fisher, Australian Opossum and Kolinsky. Raccoon, American Opossum and Nutria are also being sold in fair quantities while Beaver, Ermine, Civet Cat and the poorer grades of Wild Cat are not selling so freely. There is no gainsaying the fact that the Market finds itself in an exceedingly healthy condition. The embargo against the importation of furs from Russia, Japan, China, Australia and South America, far from having had a demoralizing influence has improved the market for both foreign and domestic goods. The manufacturers anticipate an early season influenced by the scarcity of labor and prospective higher prices for all manufactured goods. The early date of our sale is in line with this expected quick marketing of manufactured stock. It is fully expected that prices will with a few exceptions, be sustained and that some articles will advance beyond last sale prices. Goods will be received until September 3rd for our next sale which begins Sept. 23rd. Owing to congested traffic we strongly advise shipment by express wherever possible. All goods received now are placed in cold storage without extra charge. Our market reports will be issued from time to time and during the interval our Market Service Bureau is prepared to send you, upon request, accurate information, as to prevailing market conditions regarding any articles in which you may be specially interested. Liberal advances will be made whenever desired upon receipt of merchandise.

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
