

MINERS ARE RETURNING TO THEIR WORK AGAIN

The Strike Leaders, However Assert they Will Not Yield

(Canadian Press.) GLASGOW, Mar. 27—Several hundreds of Scottish miners, including many of the trades unionists, returned to work today.

LONDON, Mar. 26—Unless the National miners' strike is settled within two or three days and a million idle miners return to their pits it means the leaders will go back to their respective districts in order to organize maintenance and relief for the distressed families and ask other organizations to assist them.

This is the substance of a statement by one of the men foremost in the negotiations on the men's side who insisted that the miners no intention of further reducing their demands.

They had, he said already given up the schedule wages which was first submitted to the government and the owners agreed to accept minimum daily rates of \$1.25 for men and 50 cents for boys which was the very least they could ask the men to endorse.

MAURETANIA COULDN'T MAKE QUEENSTOWN.

QUEENSTOWN, March 24—The steamer Mauretania, on her way to New York, arrived here today, but was unable to take on board 132 passengers and many sacks of mail which were awaiting her, on account of the heavy sea.

CHEAP TELEGRAPH RATES TO YUKON.

OTTAWA, March 24—On and after April 1 the government will inaugurate a night telegram, or deferred message service, on all government-owned lines in the dominion at a minimum charge of twenty-five cents for fifty words, the same as the regular day rate for ten words.

SECOND BOMB FOR NEW YORK JURIST.

NEW YORK, March 24—Notwithstanding that it has become known that the police are in possession of a second bomb mailed to Judge Otto A. Rosalsky, of the court of general sessions, the trial judge in the Brandt case, detectives today would not disclose what they are working on to solve two mysterious attempts upon the life of the jurist.

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 24—Andre Kostasopoulos, Governor of the Island of Samos, was assassinated today by a Greek, who fired several shots at him. The assassin was arrested.

NORTH BAY, Ont., March 24—Another serious wreck occurred on the Canadian Pacific Railway, Lake Superior division on Saturday morning, following closely the accident to a coal train on Thursday last. Yesterday's wreck was a head-on collision between a freight train on which were settlers and stock going west, and an east bound freight train. It occurred near Amyot, a station 362 miles west of North Bay.

SHOT TO DEATH ON DOORSTEP

NEW YORK BOY SCOUT KILLS LAD WITH HIS RIFLE.

NEW YORK, March 24—I didn't know it was so bad, was the explanation which the police say, twelve-year-old Julius Matland gave today for shooting and killing Henry Lockhardt, nine years old, yesterday during a "battle" in a vacant lot in the Bronx.

The boy, according to the story the police say he told, had gone out on a "hike" dressed in his Boy Scout uniform and had borrowed the rifle with which he did the shooting.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT UNMASKED IMPOSTER.

TORONTO, March 24—To be noticed by the Duke of Connaught at the recent review of the army and navy veterans would have brought joy to the heart of most veterans, but to one it brought trouble.
