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

BIGGEST DAY SINCE SEPT. AT EXCHANGES
 Restoration Of Confidence Due To Progress Of Congress Re Economy Bill.

New York and New Orleans Cotton Exchanges were not slated to open until tomorrow, but staples in other markets joined the swift ascent of securities. Silver futures on the National Metal Exchange jumped about one cent an ounce; while there was little trading in copper, futures quotations were boosted 8-10 of a cent a pound. Raw hide futures gained about a cent a pound, and smaller advances were registered in such staples as raw silk, sugar, coffee, cocoa and crude rubber.
 The so-called Wet Stocks were prominent in the advance, as the measure to legalize beer in the United States had been passed with a big majority in the House of Representatives during the 12-day market suspension.
 It was in the decisive measures taken in Washington, rather than in news from business and industry that financial quarters found new encouragement. The progress in Congress of the Governmental Economy Bill was stressed in several quarters as an outstanding factor in the restoration of confidence.
 Trading on the Stock Exchange involved a turnover of 3,061,287 shares, not a large volume compared to 1929, but nevertheless it was the biggest day since last Sept. 22.

British Gov. Asks Review By Tariff Board
 (Canadian Press Cable)
 LONDON, March 15.—The British Government has requested the Canadian Government to have present duties on a wide range of articles reviewed by the Tariff Board.
 The request is in accordance with article 13 of the United Kingdom-Canada pact signed during the Imperial Conference which provided the United Kingdom Government the right to seek perusal of any duties which it might deem excessive.
 Articles included in the request are yarns, certain textiles, clothing, whiskey and canned herring.
 OTTAWA, March 15.—The new Tariff Board has not yet commenced to function and is not likely to until after the Budget Debate in the House has been concluded, it was learned today when officers of the board were questioned as to a reference from the British Government for a review of the rates on certain commodities.
 The board's offices have not yet been prepared and will not be ready for occupancy until the end of March. In any event the Board would not be able to complete organization until after the Budget has been disposed of because of the fact that technical officers necessary to lay out the work of the Board will be otherwise engaged.
 The Budget will be presented to the House on Tuesday next.
 In the meantime requests for review of the rates on various commodities are being received and

LEG AMPUTATED—A distressing accident occurred Tuesday afternoon on the farm of Mr. T. P. Cullen, Charlottetown. Royalty, when George Chappelle, 19 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Chappelle, while assisting in threshing had the misfortune to have one of his feet caught in the revolving drum of the machine. The leg was drawn in a considerable distance before the thresher could be stopped. He was rushed to the City Hospital where it was found necessary to amputate the injured member below the knee.
P. E. I. POTATO SHIPMENTS.—Potato shipments from Prince Edward Island this winter are about on a par with those of last year, said M. F. Tompkins, traffic manager of the Canadian National Railways Atlantic Region Wednesday morning. Seed potatoes destined for various sections of the United States have brought the shipments up to a level equal to 1932 he said. Asked how the shipments in the last two years compare with those of peak years, back in 1928 and 1929, he said they were far below the level established then. The potatoes in recent years have been carried by rail to Halifax, where they are transferred to boats and transported to United States markets by water. In the old days the shipments were practically all made direct from Prince Edward Island ports by water.—Moncton Transcript.

BEATTY PAYS TRIBUTE TO THORNTON
 (Canadian Press)
 MONTREAL, March 15.—E. W. Beatty, K. C., President and Chairman of the Board of the Canadian Pacific Railway, today made the following tribute to Sir Henry Thornton, former President of the Canadian National Railways who died yesterday.
 "The news of Sir Henry Thornton's death came as a great shock for which we were not prepared. He was peculiarly endowed with a capacity for forming and holding friendships and was by justly very responsive to appeals made to his generosity. During his ten year residence in Canada he occupied a unique position in the imagination of the Canadian people. He was a convincing advocate of the interests he represented and while the intensive competition which marked the last decade in Canadian railway activities meant some differences between the companies, our personal relations were rarely disturbed, and during the fall of 1931 we were almost in constant consultation on general railway problems. I have always felt that in many respects the policies he advocated were not those which appealed to his own judgment but were rather forced upon him by the position which he occupied. Not the least of his talents was his ability as a public speaker, an asset of tremendous value to him and his Company during his tenure of office. He was a salesman of great ability, was warm hearted and generous to a degree, and largely endowed with geniality and a sense of humor. His passing will be deplored by an extremely wide circle of friends."

Empire Materials For Government Contracts
 OTTAWA, March 15.—(C.P.)—Empire materials are to be used on Government contracts in future. This applies, not only to contracts let by the departments of Government but also to the Canadian National Railways and Government Boards and Commissions.
 An Order-in-Council now approved provides "that whenever materials or goods of a kind or class not produced or manufactured in Canada are required by any department of the Government or by any contractor of His Majesty engaged in a building or other contract, provision be made, when tenders are called for or in the contract, to the effect that such materials or goods shall be of Empire production or manufacture and that where standards are specified an Empire standard be adopted, less it is conclusively shown that the goods or materials in question cannot be obtained within the Empire."
 It is further recommended "that the Canadian National Railway and every board, commission or other similar body under the control of Parliament be requested to adopt a similar rule with reference to its purchases and contracts."

Increase In Production Of Butter
 FREDERICTON, N. B., Mar. 15.—(C.P.)—Creamery butter production in New Brunswick reached a new high point in the history of the Province during the fiscal year ending October 31, 1932, according to the annual report of the Department of Agriculture, tabled in the Legislature yesterday. The total output of the 23 creameries was 2,749,330 pounds, exceeding the previous year's make by 333,328 pounds.
 Meanwhile factory cheese production declined 37,948 pounds to 458,313. Eleven factories operated during the year, two less than the previous year.
 The total potato crop was placed at 3,856,000 cwt as compared with 6,341,000 in 1931 the average yield per acre falling from 107 cwt to 80 while the acreage drop from 52,263 to 48,200.

Swimming Pool For Roosevelt Planned
 NEW YORK, March 16.—A plan is afoot for the people of President Roosevelt's home state to present him with a swimming pool for the White House so that he may keep physically fit under the tremendous tasks of the presidency.
 A newspaper has started the fund with a \$1,000 contribution today and announced it would act as a medium for citizens to express their affection. It will receive contributions from pennies and stamps up.
