"Bill," a fully qualified chemist, hasn't had a drink for seven months is working again as a chemist after 12 years.

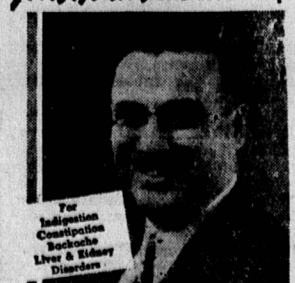
