



**A SURPRISE.** LONDON, Aug. 22.—Astonishment is expressed at the Ottawa statement that British government orders in Canada for war supplies now reach the enormous total of \$230,000,000. The English public little realize the importance of Canadian industrialism is capable of rendering in the present war. The Pall Mall Gazette says General Bertram's figures area "remarkable demonstration of the capacity of Canada as a manufacturing centre. The more we can depend on Canada and the other Dominions in this respect the better it will be. Hats off to Our Lady of the Snows." Financial authorities here estimate that this enormous Canadian exportation of war supplies, added to the confident expectation of greatly increased breadstuffs exports, will be of the greatest assistance in easing the Anglo-Canadian economic situation.

**INTERESTING LETTER.**—Mrs Dr) Conroy, of this city, has received a letter from her niece, Mrs H. R. Cooper, of London, England, enclosing a post card from her cousin, Corporal J. Fraser, son of the late Dr Fraser, of St. John's Bay, and nephew of Mrs Conroy. Corporal Fraser has been a prisoner of war in Germany for some time. He writes as follows: "To say I was delighted to get your parcel is putting it very mildly. When I got it this week I did not know what it was. I have heard from Aunt Emma. Would you mind letting her know that I am getting along all right as I shall not be able to write her for some time yet." Mrs Hooper is a daughter of Mr Fenton Newberry. She has a brother also on active service. He is a midshipman on board the Anstruther, at the Bay, and the many friends of Corporal Fraser in this city will be glad to learn that he is well, although a prisoner.

**OUR TREES**  
Sir.—Your editorial in this morning's issue, about "our shade trees" is most timely. Throughout our city the ravages of this pest can be seen in our shade trees wherever you cast your eyes, and the Guardian, is the first paper, and its editor is the first person, to call attention to the fact that is going on in this valued asset of our city.

In early summer my orchard trees were attacked. I had seen, two summers ago, the orchards near Alberton that had been completely killed out by this pest. In my orchard the yellow leaves were beginning to fall while others on the trees were turning brown and withered as if scorched by lightning. I purchased at Mr. Crabb's hardware store a 2 lbs. bottle of "Sherwin-Williams new process Arsenate of Lead" and dissolved it in 40 gallons of water. I sprayed with this several times and had the satisfaction of seeing the pest not only killed out, but the trees, in a very short time assumed their usual healthy appearance and bore an excellent crop of cherries. The apple and plum trees are doing likewise.

The experts, sent from Ottawa to look into the Alberton orchards, gave instructions as to the nature of this insect, too minute to be detected by the naked eye, and recommended, besides spraying, that the fallen, yellow leaves from the cherry trees be gathered and burned. These instructions I have not neglected.

This morning in passing the P. W. C. square, I counted thirteen beautiful shade trees badly scorched by this pest. If sprayed at once they may be saved but it must be done at once. ## AUSTRALIANS RALLYING TO CALL TO ARMS

MELBOURNE, Australia, Aug. 21.—The appeal from the British War Office for more soldiers has met with such an increase in recruiting that the Australian Government will be able to double the October and November reinforcements, making them 10,526 for each of those months instead of 5,263, the usual monthly quota. It will also be possible to send to the front in November a complete brigade of infantry, and this offer has been accepted by the Imperial authorities.

When the troops now ready for the front have embarked, Australia will have despatched 80,000 men to the front, and have to her credit 20,000 more men who have enlisted for imperial service—a total of 100,000 men.

The movement of the larger quotas of troops this fall will require greatly increased transportation facilities, a point to which the newly created minister of the navy, Jens A. Jensen, is devoting his attention. Some of the largest and finest vessels in Australia have been taken over by the Government.

Mr. Jensen claims that the Australian merchant marine, including troops, is the third largest in the world.

A bill providing for a war census to determine the wealth of Australia, both in fighting men and finance is now under consideration by the Federal Parliament. Under the terms of the bill practically every male adult will have to answer questions as to the possibility of enlistment, and women as well as men will report on their income or property. The duty of procuring the proper forms and answering the questions asked thereon will devolve on the citizens of the commonwealth, but failure to perform this duty may be punishable.

Attorney General Wm. M. Hughes, denied that this censure was a description in the accepted sense of that term, but he said that the object will be to determine the sacrifices, which the continuance of the war has been made inevitable—the sacrifices of life and of wealth—fall upon all in fair proportion.

5th Gloucestershire Reg't  
British Expeditionary Force.

Dear Dad,—  
I was very pleased to get your letter last evening. As we are now billeted in a small French village for a day or two I am taking advantage of this to write you. You will observe that we have come out to do our share. We fare very well indeed so far as food is concerned, but we are roughing it in fine style. Where we are I must not say. I am quite well, in fact I have never felt better in my life. I do hope that the boys from home are doing better in coming forward. So far they have been shamefully slack. They are needed as much now as at any other time.

The crops just here are very good and are ripe already. What are they like at home? Write that again. I was glad to get that clipping. I know a whole lot of those who have fallen. Best wishes to you all and kind regards to all who may enquire after me.

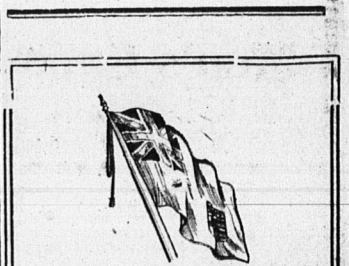

## WAITING FOR REPORTS OF GERMAN COMMANDER.

While waiting the report of the German commander at Berlin, officials here are greatly interested in what Ambassador Gerard has to say as to what he may have discovered in the German capital about the attitude of high German officials there.

Officials here make no attempt to minimize the situation. Every where the possibility of a severance of diplomatic relations between the United States and Germany is discussed as likely if it develops that the Arabic was deliberately torpedoed without regard to the question as to whether she made an hostile approach upon the submarine.
