From a small fund contributed by members of the society for current expenses \$15.90. Total \$37.90 leaving a balance of \$8.88. The speaker always being furnished by the society who, by the way receive their expenses and a monthly payment of \$11.90 (eleven dollars).

Now Sir, the foregoing is a full and correct statement of Sunday's meeting to which I am prepared to swear if so desired, and as all our meetings here and elsewhere are conducted along similar lines there should not be much if any trouble to ascertain the much talked of source of these fabulous sums spent by "The International Bible Students." Potato Market

Sir.—I notice in your issue of April 19th that "Liberal Conservative" is of the opinion that 80 cents does not seem to satisfy the farmer for a bushel of potatoes. I cannot agree with the statement that farmers cannot make a profit on potatoes at 80 cents per bushel under the high cost of living and the high wages he pays for farm labor. Now, to be straight and fair in all dealings we will first consider the wages of the present day and the wages that were paid before the war started was \$20 to \$22 per month on a farm. Potatoes were grown then for 30 to 40 cents per bushel, and all farmers claim they were well paid for their product. Today potatoes are selling from 50 to 65 cents, and last fall were selling for 85 cents. Farmers received twice as much as four years ago, and the men they have hired received the same wages as four years ago. Then farmers will try and persuade the public that they cannot make any profit at 80 cents. If this is the case they must have gone in the hole when they were growing them for 40 cents. Now, as our country is at war and people are supposed to be patriotic to one another, where is the poor laboring class going to come in when he has to buy his potatoes at \$1.60 per bushel, and sometimes \$2.00, on \$22 per month wages? If the laboring man was like the farmer and looked for \$35 or \$40 a month on the farm they would think this awful wages. But if the laboring man was paid according to the advance in products he should receive \$40 to be on the same footing as the farmer, and moreover, we may wonder as so many strikes take place throughout Canada and where men's work is a serious problem what is the reason for these strikes by the laboring class? Nothing less than this high price of potatoes and products. The laboring men say we cannot live under the present wages and the high cost of living, we are compelled to go on strike, whatever the loss is to our country. So, if we look at matters fairly and right I come to the conclusion that if our products such as potatoes, etc., went to \$50 per bushel, we would be compelled to pay high prices for our goods as the labor to produce our stuff is bound to rise as products rise, and if potatoes and other stuffs should go down in price there is no doubt that other goods will go down also. So, if we farmers look at the state of affairs in the right light, I consider the prices we are receiving today for our products are above what they should be. We could live easier and make more money four years ago than we can today, because labor has gone so high, and everything as well as products. I am, sir, etc. FARMER.

EGGS \$5 EACH IN FRANCE NOW.

PARIS, April 18.—Eggs are \$5 each in the occupied portion of northeastern France, according to Eugene Motte, former Mayor of Roubaix, who has just returned from that area. Meat is \$1 a pound when it is obtained at all. "The Germans have carried off all supplies and every movable piece of machinery," he says.
