Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, Sept. 26—The news for which the world has been waiting for several years finally came overnight. The franc is to be devalued 25 to 34 percent. This is to be done in line with an agreement between France, Great Britain and United States. Belgium informed France that she will join the agreement, other nations have been invited to join. It is expected that Holland, Switzerland, Italy and Germany will probably devalue. In the long run it means world trade. It is bullish from the long term viewpoint, from the short term it is difficult to say what effect it will have. If by chance stocks should be quite reactionary we would rather buy than sell.

NEW YORK Sept. 26—London—It was officially announced that there would be no gold price fixed or dealings in the Gold market today. After quoting dollars at 4.90 A 4.92 and Amsterdam 7.28 A 7.31, it was officially announced that there would be no further dealings in foreign currency exchange today.

Amsterdam—Market quiet with a slight reaction in bonds and a good demand for American issues. Gold shipments to New York and Brussels continue.

Switzerland—To make gold payments in dollars instead of francs because the dollar has definite relation to gold.

Vienna—The exchanges in central Europe had heavy liquidation of French franc while the Austrian schillings advanced. The franc was not quoted. Belgium decided today to adhere to the tri-power monetary agreement and will not further the Belga, Italy will not devalue.

Geneva—League of Nations cautiously adverted devaluation today as a means of closing the gap between price levels of gold standard and sterling countries.

London—Bullion brokers say that until foreign exchange dealings are resumed they will be unable to fix a gold price as it is impossible to convert United States dollars price for gold into sterling while no sterling dollar rate is being quoted.

Dr. Rochester Speaks At W. M. S. Annual

(Halifax Chronicle)

What we are ourselves, is what the Church is going to be, and will be, cautioned Rev. Dr. W. M. Rochester of Toronto, editor of the Presbyterian Record, addressing last night's session of the Diamond Jubilee annual of the Women's Missionary Society (Eastern Division) of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, in St. David's Presbyterian church.

His message, coupled with one from Rev. Dr. Frank Baird, minister of the First Presbyterian Church Pictou, and former Moderator of the Presbyterian Church in Canada which pointed out that in many ways the social and political program, and panaceas have failed and that there was still scope for religion and the great missionary work in the world, featured the first of the two-day program being held by the Society.

With delegates in attendance from many points in the Maritimes the sessions opened yesterday morning with Mrs. W. Clark Elliott of Sussex, N.B., president, presiding, the opening session taking the form of a devotional service.

Butter was quoted at 24 1-4 cents per pound for carlots or less of no. 1 while lots to retailers were 25 1-2 for solids and 26 1-2 for prints.

Graded egg shipments in carlots or less were 30 cents a dozen for a large, 28 for a medium, 22 22 1-2 for B and 20 for C.

Cheese averaged 14 1-4 3-4 cents per pound for Ontarios and 13 3-8 7-8 for Quebecs.
