THE 98 ton schooner Malabar, for a few days ashore at Five Fathom Hole, below Musquash, was floated yesterday morning at high water, and towed to this port by tug Neptune. The Malabar is quite badly damaged, the port side is stove in, the bilge broken and waterway also broken. The cargo consisted of about 135,000 laths, which were being shipped from Musquash to New York. Twenty thousand or more was washed overboard and lost when the vessel went ashore and 108,000 were lightened on scows and towed here, and there are in the neighborhood of 7,000 in the hold. A survey on the Malabar will be held.—St. John Telegraph.
