BARING MORNING LETTER

NEW YORK, June 9—July wheat is down 15 cents since I last mentioned it on April 22, when I warned against its purchase. Would not buy it even yet. Nor the September option either. In my last two letters I said the averages should react to about 173, and Saturday I said further that it is unlikely that this setback would fail to materialize. Purchasers were advised if they went to 173. Today the averages are set back to 173.5 and they might react to or very slightly below 173 during the next two or three days. Buy the leaders. MOS had a normal technical setback. Keep long. HR made another new high and I hope you bought it around 107 to 106, as repeatedly advised. Hold for 150. Reacted 37 closes at 104-2. You will see it above 50 again. Don't Mines, which you should have below 39 sold at 42. You will see it again 10 points higher. Anaconda can still be bought around or below 53 for a new high, two points from its last top. Buy it at 140. Holland Furnace repeatedly recommended when it was around 36 or AR which you should have between 8 and 79, should sell near 125. If it reacts to 87 buy more. RU should sell much higher. Keep long of it. Should be bought from 99 down for near 130. RC as well as ARO, are buys on dips. M may be bought 53 to 52, Int. Det. Store 23, Macy 46 to 45, Gimbel near 23.

BANON MORNING LETTER

Yesterday a lower opening was succeeded by a moderate recovery which at general probabilities favor early resumption of the advance. Irregularity today may be used for adding to present positions in C. Cn. GE, GM, M, ARO, GT Nor Pfd. PX, NF, TX, UAR and BOE failed to hold. The marked drop in offerings on the afternoon reaction was encouraging. Trading in Canadian industries was an exceptionally dull affair yesterday. National Steel Car reacted to 51 and closed 51. Still a buy around 51. Pend Oreille, recommended lower down, moved up to a high of 380. Buy on minor dips. Home Oil is showing steady improvement in its market action. Ability to take offerings in the 2.00-2.10 area is encouraging. Hold. Buy more around 2.00. Stocks in a buying range include Noranda, IK, CP, CPC and Price Common. Gold staged an impressive recovery yesterday. Increasing activity in the senior gold division is broadening out. Prospects continue to favor an advance from the current level in the near future. Dips may be used for adding to present positions in East Malartic, MacLeod Cocksutt, Kirkland, O'Brien, Macassa, Slacoe, Sladen Malartic, McIntyre and Moneta.

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MORNING STOCK LETTER

NEW YORK, June 9—Gold in London this morning is 140s 7d. compared with 140s 8 1-2d yesterday. Gold stocks are firm again. Dividend meetings today include American Brake Shoe, Island Creel, and Mack Truck. Labor difficulties show no improvement. However, the labor holiday in Lansing has been called off. We would expect an irregular market today and the probability is that the oil will do better and also the mail order stocks.

WASHINGTON, June 8—Both President Roosevelt and Secretary Morgenthau in private conversation with visitors over the past few weeks have stated repeatedly the intention of this government to hold its gold price at \$35 an ounce despite contrary rumors, according to persons who have talked with them. Repetition of these assurances is believed to have contributed to waning of the gold scare.

Currencies

NEW YORK, June 9 — (AP) — Reports of new French budgetary difficulties reacted against the franc in the foreign exchange market today. The pound sterling, on the other hand, pushed forward on the belief of traders the gold price question had been shelved.

Francs closed off 00 1-8 of a cent at 445 1-8; sterling added 5-16 of a cent at \$4.93 11-16; the Netherlands guilder was off 00 1-2 of a cent and the Swiss franc gained 00 1-2 of a cent in quiet dealings. Canadian dollars were unchanged at par.

Grain

CHICAGO, June 9 — With the United States government June crop report expected tomorrow acting as a restraint, price setbacks from earlier sharp gains characterized wheat trading late today.

An opposite late factor, though, was notice taken of an unofficial trade statement that 5,000,000 acres of wheat in Saskatchewan, would not average 5 bushels an acre yield. The tenor of various domestic weekly state crop reports today was generally favorable.

At the close, wheat was 3-8 to 1 cent above yesterday's finish, July 1.09 5-8 to 3-8, Sept. 1.09 3-8 to 1-2, corn unchanged to 1-4 lower, July 1.16 3-4 to 1.17, Sept. 1.03 3-4 to 1.04, and oats varying from 1-4 decline to 1-2 cent advance.
