A meeting of the P. E. Island Poultry Association was held last night in the Prince of Wales College. The attendance was not very large. Matters in connection with the coming poultry show were generally discussed and judging from the remarks of some of those present the outlook for a successful show is good.

Rev. J. F. Floyd spoke to a good audience in the Central Christian Church last night on the subject The Unusual Invitation. The discourse was an eloquent and earnest appeal to the sinner and was listened to with much attention. The subject for tonight will be "Is the Bible a Dead Letter." This will be an interesting topic and all are cordially invited to come and bring their friends.

In view of the coming Evangelistic Campaign under Dr Elliott, there will be held in the First Methodist Church tonight a Union Prayer Service in which all city churches are invited to participate. At the Halifax Exhibition the following Provincialists won prizes. In Lace Drawn work Miss Alice McMurray secured six prizes. In poultry P. C. Brown secured four firsts and two seconds, A. A. Paoli four firsts; Thomas Handrahan three firsts; L. A. Hazzard seven firsts and one second; A. Boswell two firsts and two seconds. In Turkeys A. Boswell gets two seconds, a first and a third prize; in ducks and geese one first. In horses Roper Bros secure first for Hackney. In Clydesdale P. C. Brown won three firsts on Lord Dalmeny. In seeds Robert Drake, Cornwall, won first for wheat, white spring. In poultry Charles Thorne won two firsts and one second.

Yesterday J. J. Dunn paid into Court a \$100 fine and the additional costs of \$33. Henry Duffy appeared before the Police Court on a charge of drunkenness, which resulted in a sentence of \$60 or twenty days being imposed. However, the sentence was suspended pending good behavior.

While the S. S. Lady Sybil was lying at Grindstone breakwater taking on board freight, Frederick Arsenau, brother of Capt Azades Arsenau of the Marine and Fisheries department was seized with an epileptic fit while walking down the wharf and fell into the water. He was noticed by some of the workmen employed on the freight shed, but who appeared helpless to render any material aid as the sea and undertow around the breakwater together with the smooth face of the wharf made any attempt at rescue extremely perilous, and were it not for the presence of mind and bravery of steward A. F. Burns, Mr Arsenau would certainly have been drowned. Mr Burns who noticed the excitement ran down the wharf and without a moment's consideration of the risk he took leaped into the sea and at the peril of his own life kept Mr Arsenau who weighs about 225 lbs above water until when nearly exhausted assistance came from the shore. After some ten minutes of brisk working over him Mr Arsenau gained consciousness, and appeared to be in a fair way to recovery. Too much credit can not be given to Mr Burns for his brave act and we understand this is not by any means the first rescue he has made at the peril of his own life.
