Will Administer Family Allowances Says Mr. Bracken

Late Friday night, after he had returned to his hotel room following the enthusiastic meeting at the Forum where he was acclaimed by thousands, the Hon. John Bracken, leader of the Progressive Conservative Party, granted a brief interview to a representative of the Guardian. He was asked what the attitude of the Progressive Conservative Party was, with respect to family allowances, a matter of great interest to the majority of Canadians and especially residents of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. Bracken unhesitatingly made this answer: "The Mackenzie King government introduced the measure and the Progressive Conservative Party supported the government in the legislation now on the statute books. With respect to family allowances, it is the law of the land and the Progressive Conservative Party will recognize it as such and administer it accordingly."

Looking Ahead In Ottawa

(By The Ottawa Staff of The Canadian Press) - A rough calculation indicates that approximately 325,000 men may be discharged from the army into civilian life within the next few months. This calculation is based on an overseas report that 25,000 men are slated for service in the continuing army of occupation in Europe and an Ottawa report that about another 25,000 men comprised of an active division and one division of reinforcements are slated for the Pacific. It is not possible to work out the discharge surplus from the Navy and R.C.A.F. because there have been no specific reports on their continuing requirements.

Soldier Training: The Royal Commission on Veterans' Qualifications is completing an itinerary which will mean a Dominion-wide tour for consultations with Provincial Government and other authorities. The Commission, which is under the chairmanship of Col. Wilfrid Bovey of Montreal, has the job of trying to find means to assure that veterans returning to civilian employment will receive credit for the training they have received in the forces.

Labor Code: Changes in the Federal Labor Code are under consideration by the Dominion Government and consultations have already taken place with the Provinces but there has not yet been any definite indications of what the changes will be or when they will be introduced. The Code, which came into effect in March, 1944, covers collective bargaining in all war industries and has also been extended to all provinces except Quebec, Alberta and Prince Edward Island. Saskatchewan revoked the application to its non-war industries when it introduced its own act.

Reprieve: Britain's need for fresh eggs should result in a reprieve from the axe for Canada's yearling hens—usually slaughtered at this time of year—provided they still are laying. Such birds, the Agricultural Department says, should be kept producing eggs to meet overseas commitments. Britain wants fresh eggs this spring and has asked Canada also to store them for delivery in the fall, the season of low production in the United Kingdom.

N. B. LOAN TOTAL - SAINT JOHN, N.B., May 13 - (CP) - With returns still incomplete, New Brunswick's victory loan total tonight was \$30,090,350. The minimum objective had been \$25,850,000. Subscriptions reported Saturday amounted to \$2,163,860. Officials were hopeful that complete figures will eclipse the record high of \$31,540,000 invested in the seventh loan. New Brunswick became the fourth province to reach its quota for special names, door-to-door canvassing and employee sales. One of the latest special names subscriptions announced was \$1,000,000 by the K.C. Irving interests.
