GILBERT PARKER ON A NAVAL DEFENCE.

Gilbert Parker, the well-known Canadian novelist and now the Conservative member for Gravesend in the British House of Commons, recently addressed the body on the question of naval defence and the duty of the Colonies to contribute toward that service. The proposition had been put forward during the debate that the Colonies ought to contribute to the support of the navy in proportion to their population. Mr. Parker strongly dissented from this opinion. He contended, very justly as we think, that a fairer proportion would be one based upon the extent of their relative commerce and wealth as compared with the Mother Country. The commerce of the self-governing colonies is but a fraction of that of the United Kingdom. Equally their brief period of existence has not given time for the accumulation of wealth such as has been going on in the central islands for a thousand years.

Mr. Parker also pointed out that the Colonies were yet engaged in the pioneer work of reclaiming the wilderness, opening up mines, building railways, establishing industries and trade, building up new institutions and establishing governmental administration. All this was a work of building and strengthening the Empire. He did not believe that the Colonies were at present prepared to do more than this, except to look after their own military defence. At least he thought the Colonies were not prepared to put their hands in their pockets unless they had some form of representation in some council of the Empire, such as a Committee of Defence, or that House, he thought, however, that they did not desire the latter. But he would repeat the words of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, "If you desire us to share the responsibilities you must call us to your counsels."

Mr. Parker, during his speech was sometimes challenged by a question from the Ministerial side of the House, and was occasionally cheered by the Nationalists' but on the whole appears to have spoken wholesome truth, which it was desirable should be brought to the notice of the British Parliament and public.

The question has been raised among horsemen whether Crescos or any of the more recent trotting champions could beat the time made by Maud S. years ago if compelled to trot in the old-fashioned, high-wheeled sulky in which she did her work. It would be interesting to have the trial made. Evidently the low-wheeled, rubber-tired, ball-bearing sulky is in part to be credited with the record-breaking since the days of Maud S.

The Winnipeg Free Press of the 7th instant announced the arrival of the first contingent of harvest helpers from the east, 1000 strong, and added, "They are thrice welcome." Altogether over 19,000 men have since arrived from the east.

An Ottawa despatch states that Sir Louis Davies will remain in the Ottawa Cabinet until after the visit of the Duke and Duchess of York and will then accept an appointment to the Supreme Courts of Canada. THE GUARDIAN has no other information upon this point, but the statement made seems not an improbable one.

While the country is waiting with increasing impatience for the census returns the Toronto Globe's Ottawa correspondent makes the statement "that the returns will be disappointing cannot be denied." The reason for expecting disappointing returns is given by the correspondent that while the partial returns from census districts show an increase in the number of dwellings and of families there has not been, apparently a like increase in population. He says: "Taking 67 Ontario census districts out of 82, they show an increase over 1891 of about 38,000 in dwellings, 38,000 in families, and 31,000 in population. Will anyone explain how this extraordinary result can be reached except by the fact that the figures of 1891 were so padded as to be utterly untrue?" But this is not the only reason. On the average, since the introduction of American farming machinery, fewer hands are required to carry on farming operations. One, two, or three of the boys, and perhaps some of the girls go away, to the Northwest, the Pacific Coast or to the States, and the average size of the family at home is in consequence diminished. This was a thing to be expected.
