### THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Feb. 27.—(Eggs)—Market situation generally is a little steadier. Yesterday the Chicago spot and February futures closed higher, chiefly as a result of open contracts still incomplete. United States eggs continue to arrive in fair quantity at Ontario and Quebec points. Jobbing specials 46, extras 44, firsts 41, seconds 38, Montreal markets steady, extras jobbing 45, firsts 42, seconds 35. Saskatchewan markets unchanged. Calgary continued cold weather interfering with receipts. Firsts jobbing \$14 per case, seconds \$10.50 per case.

Montreal—With the exception of sales of odd loads of low grade oats for March shipment the export trade in Canadian grain here today was quiet. There was no change in the condition of the local market for oats, prices being maintained at the recent advance noted, while a firm tone prevailed in the spring wheat flour market. There was no actual change in values with the demand being of a limited character. The market for winter wheat four was without any new feature to note. Little business was transacted in milled feed but the tone was steady. The movement of standard grades of oats was small. The feature of the egg situation was the further weakness and prices secured a decline of one cent per dozen, and prospects are that they will go lower owing to the liberal supplies coming forward. A stronger feeling developed in the butter trade and prices advanced one cent per pound which was attributed to the better demand from outside sources. The cheese market was quiet with fodder made No. 1 white and colored goods quoted at 20¢ to 20½ cents per pound, and No. 2 grade at 18¢ to 19½ cents per pound. Beans were unchanged at \$2.70 per bushel.

# THE MARITIME PROVINCES DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

## An Outline of What it is and What it Means to the Citizens of the Maritimes

### —Its Initial Program and the Activities it Contemplates.

A resolution advocating the organization of an association to speed up and co-ordinate development activities in the Maritime Provinces, which had been adopted by the Maritime Board of Trade in 1923 resulted in the organization in May, 1924, of the "Canadian Maritime Provinces Development Association." Membership in this body is open to all persons, firms, societies, or corporations in the Maritimes and its affairs are managed and administered by a board of eighteen directors, six from each Province, elected by the members from among themselves. Its officers are appointed annually by the board of directors, as is the Executive Committee consisting of president, vice-president, and two directors from each Province. The latter meets monthly and supervises the operations and business of the Association generally, but the department will function largely through special advisory committees, which will deal with special development problems and undertakings.

### Aims and Objects

The aims and objects of the association are as follows:

1. To further develop the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, agriculturally, industrially, and commercially.
2. To promote, co-operate with, or otherwise assist, any other associations or institutions, with objects altogether or in part similar to those of the Association.
3. To promote local, interprovincial and international, agricultural and industrial colonization.
4. To act as agent, without remuneration for the listing, sale, exchange or improvement of lands, natural resources, business, industries, or any other enterprise in the Maritime Provinces.
5. To aid in procuring capital, credit, or any other assistance for establishing, extending, developing, or re-organizing any enterprises or industries intended to be carried on by any person or corporation with a view to developing the lands or resources of the Maritime Provinces, or of inducing settlement therein.
6. To encourage the discovery of, and investigate and make known the nature and merit of, inventions and processes which may see application of being used by persons engaged in agriculture, fishing, mining, and lumbering or in developing the natural resources of the Maritime Provinces.
7. To procure information in regard to the natural resources and industries of the Maritime Provinces, and to adopt such means of advertising and making known the same as may seem expedient.

### HOW TO HOLD WHAT PEOPLE HAVE; HOW TO REPATRIATE OUR SONS AND DAUGHTERS; HOW TO INDUCE OTHERS TO ASSIST US IN BUILDING UP THE MARITIMES AGRICULTURALLY, INDUSTRIALLY AND COMMERCIALY; HOW TO BETTER CONDITIONS FOR OUR FARMERS, MERCHANTS, AND MANUFACTURERS; AND HOW TO IMPROVE OUR TRANSPORTATION AND MARITIME FACILITIES, ARE SOME OF THE PROBLEMS THE MARITIME DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION WORKING IN CO-OPERATION WITH EXISTING AGENCIES, GOVERNMENTS AND OTHERWISE WILL ENDEAVOR TO SOLVE.

### Initial Program

The initial program of the Association is to immediately institute Maritime wide educational campaign to encourage and foster the awakening which has taken place in Maritime interests, and to secure members and finances adequate to complete its organization and commerce operations. Also to call a connection of the Board of Trade, the agricultural, industrial and commercial institutions, press, labor, legal and financial interests, etc. of the Maritime Provinces, to form a "Maritime Citizens Research Committee" the work of this Committee to be the formulation of a "Development Program (or Policy) for the Maritime Provinces" including a thorough study of our agricultural and industrial situation with a view to the conservation of our natural resources. It will enquire into the relationship of our production of manufactured products to local or Canadian consumption, and what goods are made in the Maritimes for which there is demand for export. It will function, therefore, as a "Maritime Clearing House," and its recommendations will also serve as a foundation or basis for the subsequent operation of the Development Association.
