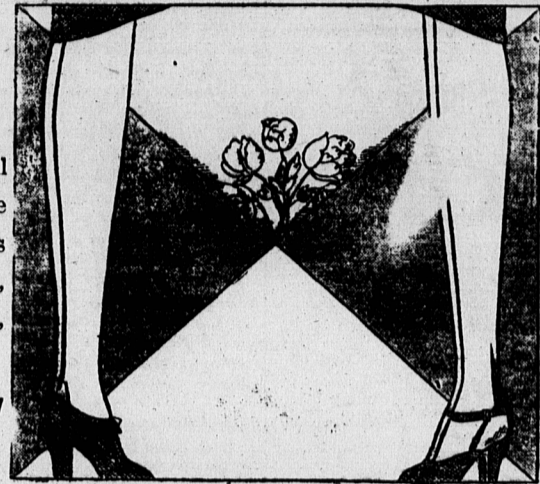

### SALVATION ARMY SELF-DENIAL CAMPAIGN

"Self-Denial" Week in the Salvation Army was instituted in the year 1886 by the Founder, William Booth. The idea was conceived to meet the financial needs of the missionary and social operations in the organization.

The observance of "Self-Denial" by Canadian Salvationists will be from May 4th to May 11th, and special offerings will be made for the missionary side of the Salvation Army in 80 countries.

Another important phase of "Self-Denial" is the public campaign for funds to finance the social operations of the Army. This simplified is just a matter of the benevolent public doing "The Samaritan" towards it's unfortunate fellows, with the Army as an executive medium. This side of the work embraces 79 Rescue Homes 16 ex-Criminals Homes, 134 Children's Homes, 112 Women's Industrial Homes, 176 Slum Stations, 340 Food

Depots and Shelters, 210 Labour Factories for the destitute, 12 Land Colonies for vagrants. The Salvation Army visits every penitentiary in this Dominion to conduct spiritual work by means of meetings and interviews. The same is done in many jails and the Army also has official Police Court officers and Matrons in larger centres. Prisoners' families are visited by Social Officers, and men met on discharge from sentences. In addition to all this, an international Bureau is conducted for the search of missing persons.

Adjutant A. W. Martin, Commanding Officer in this City, states he has been assigned an objective of \$2,000.00 to be raised by the local corps in the city and eastern part of the Province. It is announced that the local drive will open on Monday, April 22nd and prominent subscribers of the city will be personally called on by Adjutant Martin. The commercial quota is set at \$1200.

This will be followed by a house-to-house canvass during the week of May 6th, to 11th and concluding with the Annual Tag Day on Saturday, May 18th. The rural campaign will form the closing part of the effort. The public are herewith asked to be generous towards the campaign and anyone wishing to send subscriptions by mail, are invited to do so. Ensign F. Cuviller, the Officer in charge of the Summerside Corps, also announces the objective for the Western portion of the province, as set at \$600.00 and will shortly make

her personal calls on the prominent subscribers in the town of Summerside, and follow on with a residential canvass, Tag Day and rural campaign.

### DEVELOPING NEW ZEALAND OIL

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, April 15.—Development of oil fields in New Zealand has been active this year and nearly thirty bores have been sunk. Although oil of good quality has been proved at Moturoa, up till now boring has attained only small and intermittent flows. The best known bores, the Tarata and the Moturoa, were sunk to 5010 and 4360 feet respectively without, however, striking payable oil.

In June, 1925, a blow-out occurred at Moturoa, the gas coming up in great quantities, smelling of oil and a dense, black cloud enveloped the works, but the steady flow of oil recently struck is the most important in the history of the field.

There is a theory that the prospects of finding payable oil in New Zealand are better than in Australia due to a supposed oil belt which passes through Burma and the East Indies, taking a wide sweep through New Zealand and on down to the Atlantic, where the active volcanoes Erebus and Terrore may be associated with the belt.

\$81,618,624 SPENT ON IMMIGRATION SINCE YEAR 1881

OTTAWA, Ont., April 15.—A total

of 1,018,202.29 was expended by the department of immigration in the British Isles in 1928. Hon. Robert Forke, minister of immigration, informed Hon. R. J. Manion, Conservative, Fort William. The sum expended by the same department on the continent of Europe alone, last year was \$75,796.67

For obtaining of immigrants during 1928, the department spent \$1,018,202.99 in Great Britain and Ireland, \$13,537.82 on the continent of Europe and \$392,157.96 in the United States. The aggregate amount spent by the immigration department from 1881 to 1928 was \$51,618,024.96.
