HENRY FORD WINS CANDIDACY OF THE DEMOCRATS

DETROIT, August 30.—With the result of the senatorial fight definitely determined in the nomination of Commander Truman H. Newberry as republication, and Henry Ford as democratic candidates, interest in Tuesday's primary swings to the hot fight being waged for the democratic gubernatorial nomination.

The slight margin held on early returns by Edward Frensdorf, of Hudson, over John W. Bailey, of Battle Creek, was wiped out when the big Wayne county (Detroit) vote began to come in. These returns, combined with incomplete figures from twenty-five other counties, give Bailey a majority of 1,364.

## To the People of Canada

An appeal of the Navy League of Canada is being made to the generous people of this great Dominion, for funds for the relief of British and Canadian Sailors of the Navy and Mercantile Marine, as well as for the seamen of both services at present Prisoners of War in Germany.

We have every confidence that not only will a generous response be forthcoming, notwithstanding the number of calls upon our citizens, but that they will make a contribution worthy of the appeal and commensurate with the great need of urgent financial assistance to provide for the relief of our sailors and their dependents, as well as for the maintenance of Institutes, Orphanages, etc., caring for these magnificent and fearless heroes, who have kept our shores free from invasion, maintained the freedom of the seas for the Allied Nations and transported our products and our troops to the field of battle without the loss of a single life.

While Canada has no dreadnoughts or cruisers, her shores during the past four years have been protected by the British Navy at the expense of the British Tax Payer, although New Zealand and Australia have borne their share, as well as the smallest atom of the Empire, the Malay States, which have contributed a battleship. At the present time we cannot take that work upon our shoulders, but we can undertake to care for the wounded and disabled sailors and to alleviate the sorrow of the widow and the sufferings of the orphans of those whose blood-stained the decks, or who have sunk beneath the waves.

To the Sailors of the Mercantile Marine we owe the material prosperity we enjoy in Canada today, for they have carried our food products and munitions to the Allies. These men have faced every danger of mine and tide, wind and submarine, in order that the Empire's commerce might not stay its course and that the Empire's troops might pass upon their way. If, in the performance of duty a ship goes down and those sailors escape, the next you hear of them is that they are again on another ship. They do not forget that upon them and their comrades depend the safety and trade of the Empire, and whether the Empire lives or dies depends on whether or not we are all powerful at sea. If they are blown up or drowned, that is part of the risk cheerfully taken. But what of their widows and orphans?

Now what are we going to do for the wounded and disabled sailors of both services; the widows and orphans of those seamen who have paid the supreme sacrifice, as well as for the Naval and Merchant Sailors, prisoners of War in Germany? As true Canadians, we cannot ignore the responsibility that is upon us and the potency of the appeal which says that men die or suffer for our welfare; we cannot do less than honor their memory by helping to care for their loved ones.

Our sailors have always been ready to do their duty; let us be ready to respond to their appeal; to shoulder our share of the discomfort and privations entailed by this War and let nobody adopt the attitude of thinking that they, themselves, ought not to be affected by it. Let your contribution be a generous one in memory of those who sleep in the depths of the ocean and whose requiescant is sung by its ceaseless waves and in thankfulness to those who, through their faithfulness and heroism of duty in our behalf will suffer until the end of this titanic struggle.

The present appeal is made by the Navy League of Canada for the following purposes:—

- (a) For King George's Fund for Sailors.
- (b) For Sailors of the Navy and Mercantile Marine, Prisoners of War.
- (c) For the relief of British and Canadian Sailors and their dependents; for Sailors' Homes, Institutes and Hospitals in Canada and throughout the Empire.
