B., February 19.—The Charlottetown Abegweits fresh from a clean-cut and decisive victory over the St. John Comets last night, suffered the second setback at the hands of their old rivals, a record by a score of 3 to 1. A record attendance viewed the contest, and although fought on soft ice, was one of the best exhibitions seen here this winter. In justice to the vertical striped visitors it might be said they were without the services of two of their most valuable men, "Chick" Williams from the defence and Jack Gordon, stellar forward. Throughout the three periods individual endeavor predominated and many scintillating solos featured the heart-breaking pace from gong to gong. Diamond in the visitor's cage showed class in every session, displaying an uncanny ability to corral the rubber when sure bent on its road of destruction. With Diamond, each and every one of his teammates worked hard and heroically for a second straight win, but the "dairytown" line of defence was working in perfect unison and their opponents were unable to break through. The visiting hockeyists will leave for the Island in the morning where they will rest up for more important fixtures to come, that is they will enter the play-offs with New Brunswick champions on Tuesday night. After their fine display of hockey here tonight and in St. John last night, the teams that face them when at full strength will have to prove worthy of their steel as the Abegweits are fœmen to be respected and feared.

Many Changes in New Turkish Civil Code

(Canadian Press) ANKARA, Feb. 19.—The National Assembly has voted on bloc approval of the new Turkish civil code, which contains more than nine hundred articles based on the code of Switzerland. This new body of laws for regulation of the Turkish civil life is notable for the changes it made in the status of women. It gives them equal rights with men in the matter of divorce, abolishes polygamy and prohibits marriage of Moslem women with Christians. Although the code is based on that of Switzerland, it is thoroughly adapted to Turkish conditions.

Island Wins Sporting Honors (BY THE MAT MAN) (Boston Post)

Now in the seventh year of existence, the Regina Y. M. C. A. Wrestling Club has become established and accepted fact in the sporting life of the city and its members can look back over a series of glowing triumphs, and into a future rosy with its potentialities. Under the circumstances, a resume of the club's activities from the time it first saw the light of day would be entirely fitting. It was Dr. Mathieu who originated the club that was destined to bring many signal honors to Regina. In the fall of 1919 he called a meeting in the "Y" of all men interested in the two main sports and on this eventful occasion of the club was formed under the name it still possesses. The medical was elected first president and was urged to take on the duties of instructor in both wrestling and boxing. Dan Matheson, a son of Angus Matheson of Kensington, P.E.I., who had just started the grappling game and never dreamed that one day he would be Canada's premier amateur wrestler, was named vice-president. George Durand, a wrestler with quite a reputation, and present trainer of the "Vic and Pat" hockey teams, accepted the post of secretary-trainer.

Other members of note were Claus Claesson professional from Govan, Sask., who helped Dr. Matheson coach the boys and won much renown for holding Dr. Roller to one-hour draw when the grappling physician was at his best, and Jimmy Micas, the only Greek rasher ever developed in Regina. Also among those present were Clyde Haessing, now in New York; Leonard Van Alstyne, now in California; Tom Bell and Eddie Fraser. Micas feat in bringing home the Saskatchewan light and welterweight titles from Moose Jaw met was the high light of the 1919 season, 1920 was a quiet year, but the following season made up for it, in the preparation for the provincial tournament in the Mill City. Seven men were selected to represent Regina following the elimination trials held in the city, and four of them were successful—Eddie Fraser, Don Kopplin, Claus Claesson and Dan Matheson. Fraser took the 125 pound wrestling title. Kopplin the light heavy crown, and Claesson and Matheson shared honors in the heavy division, in which they were the only competitors, Claus winning the match but Dan outpointing him with padded gloves. Regina also placed two runners-up—Johnny Raho in the featherweight grappling class and Joe Ahtzner in the lightweight. Nick Walter lost his first bout. Sent to Toronto to represent Regina in 1921 Canadian Championships, Matheson was tumbled by Loppoman, Canada's lone wrestling representative in the 1920 Olympic games at Antwerp.

Starts to "Arrive" At this stage of its history the "Y" Club realized that it was developing rapidly, and a constitution was drafted, as follows: "Club membership is limited to "Y" members. "The object of the Club is to promote healthful exercise and recreation in the true spirit of sportsmanship by means of boxing and wrestling and the proper body training for these sports. "In joining the Club, members express the desire to improve themselves in the arts of boxing and wrestling and also a willingness to impart, as they are able, their knowledge to members less advanced in the sport. "The Club is always open to receive new members and pleased to entertain visitors at regular practice periods. The most backward need have no hesitation in seeking through the Club activities to start in the study of either boxing or wrestling, and much valuable training may be gained by the member who is simply seeking a healthful activity."
