**Here's the Prize Recipe for an Eggless Cake**

Dissolve the baking soda in the hot water and stir into batter; then stir in vanilla. Bake in two greased and floured 8-inch layer-cake pans in a moderate oven, 350°, about 30 minutes. 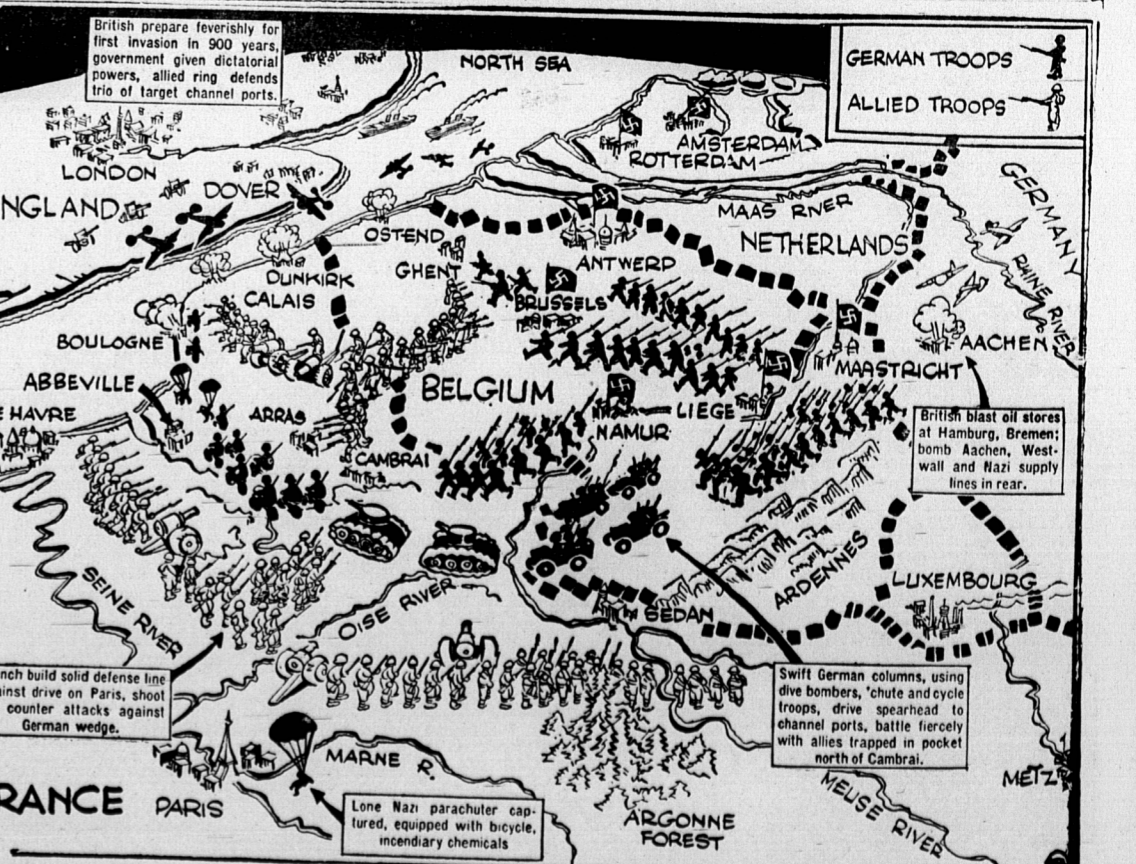

Fourth day: Germans begin laying trap for allied forces in Belgium continue toward English channel. Fifth day: German spearhead reaches Abbeville on channel, large allied forces trapped in Belgium. Sixth day: French form main defensive line behind Somme and Aisne rivers. Allies launch local counter-attacks. Seventh day: Germans spearhead to Boulogne on channel, say invasion of England is near. French retake Arras, intensify counter-attacks. Allied pincer threatens German salient to channel.
