The car ferry steamer will maintain a tri-weekly service between Georgetown and Pictou. The mail train left last night at 8.30 for Cape Traverse. The mail boats make their first crossings by that route today. The mail train from Georgetown arrived in the city at 10.20 last night.

ISLAND OFFICER HEARD FROM.—Dr. W. J. McMillan, Health Officer, has received a letter from his brother Sergeant Stephen McMillan of the 242nd Battalion, now at Witley Camp, England, prior to proceeding to the front. The Sergeant says he is forcibly struck by the absence of young men of his age in England, as contrasted with the large number still out of the khaki, in Canada. In the great cities as well as in the smaller towns in the old country Sergeant McMillan states there is scarcely an eligible for service young man to be seen in civilian clothes, while in passing through Montreal and other Canadian towns scores, yes—hundreds of young fellows, apparently very fit, could be observed without the khaki. It is evident that many too many, are still holding back. Sergeant McMillan was offered a commission but as the acceptance of such would necessitate his severance from his Battalion and remaining in Canada, at least nine months after his departure for Overseas service, the gallant Sergeant declined the Commission and sailed with the 242nd. This is the spirit which is most worthy of emulation. Of such men this Province and Country are justly proud.

This animal was in prime condition and as nice looking a carcass as any expert could wish to see. Its proportions were magnificent, and it weighed a total of 735 pounds, which, at 16 cents per pound, brought to its owner the very substantial sum of \$117.60. Her pig has seldom ever been brought to market, and none, it is stated, have brought the prices which Mr. McGregor's giant porker has realized for him. This would possibly be a record price for any pig marketed in Canada.

WHERE THE LATEST ROYAL WEDDING TOOK PLACE A HISTORIC CHAPEL

The Chapel Royal, where the second portion of the marriage ceremony of Prince George of Battenberg and Countess Nada Torby took place, has much historical interest. The King and Queen are the only living members of our Royal Family who have been married in the Chapel Royal, St. James's; but Queen Victoria and Prince Albert were wedded within these small precincts, as were their daughter, the Princess Royal, and the then Crown Prince of Prussia. Queen Anne (then Princess Anne) and Prince George of Denmark, and George IV, and Queen Caroline, were married in this small oratory. The first Royal marriage celebrated there was that of the oldest son of the Prince of Orange, and a daughter of Charles I, styled the Lady Mary in 1641. The chapel is quite small and can only seat about two hundred and fifty. The Royal Gallery—or King's Closet, as it is called—faces the altar; at one side is the organ gallery, and there are galleries for pews and other privileged persons. The register has great historical interest and contains the autographs of many kings and queens and other exalted personages.

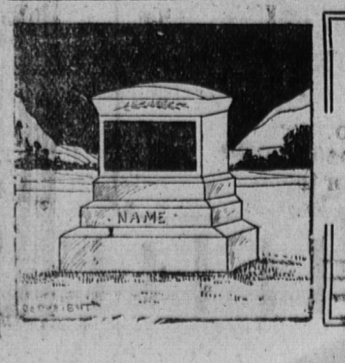

ORIGIN OF THE BAYONET
The bayonet which the quinquies before the war said was an obsolete weapon, has proved its great value in the recent movements of the British. Its name comes from that of Bayonne, a little town in the Basque country in France, in the Basque with Spain, down in the far corner of the Biscay. There it was first manufactured. A Basque regiment, having run out of ammunition, and wishing to sell their lives dearly, took the suggestion of one of their number that they should fix their long bayonets to the ends of their muskets and charge therewith and try to break through the ranks of their enemies. This they did—the first bayonet charge in history—and their success in extricating themselves from a very warm corner showed the value of the new weapon and led to its manufacture and adoption by every cavalry and army in the world.—London Answers.
