London's Hospitals "Are Front Line Stations"

Despite Constant Raids, Doctors and Nurses Keep System Going Smoothly

LONDON, Feb 25 - I was a little like being in a Henry Ford river Rouge plant, watching this London Westminster Hospital in action. As the ambulances flowed down the quarter-mile-long underground ramp and stopped briefly at the "in-patient" entrance, stretcher bearers passed the casualties on to the waiting ambulances.

As the stretcher bearers passed through the entrance, two doctors working with an X-ray person, efficiency examined, classified and ticked each patient - all in one motion. Anna A. Kinber, 55, "brought in dead," was given the orange B.I.D. ticket and shipped off to the morgue. James Sullivan, 54, "crushed legs and incendiary burns on face and hands," was tagged with a Seriously Injured red label and sent forward to the operating theater. Helen Silverman, 23, "face cuts from flying glass," was classified with a Minor Injury neutral-shade ticket and wheeled off to the first aid post. Later, she would walk or ride home.

GIVING ANAESTHESIA FOR 48 HOURS

THERE was a lull in casualties about then and young Dr. David Wynn-Williams turned and said he was going over to the medical school wing to relax for a few minutes. He said it might refresh me, too, on carrying down a few doctors lined with patients who had been carried down from the upper floors for the duration of this nighty blitz, David said some nights were difficult, though fortunately this wasn't one of them. "I'm still tired," he said, "from that forty-eight-hour stretch two days ago, when I did nothing but stand and give anaesthetic hour after hour." Moving from one wing to another you passed more patients lining the walls. In one ward, David stopped for a minute and talked with the nurse. Both moved over then, to the bedside of a woman whose face and hands had been badly burned by flame; an incendiary had exploded as she was dressing a child. INFORMALITY OF A FRATERNITY HOUSE

It was the complete disregard for red tape and the emphasis upon individual initiative which was making this run so smoothly. All during the walk you had noticed nurses, stretcher bearers, young doctors moving from job to job without direction. And somehow everything seemed to click. The trained nurses moved with the doctors on a level of equality seldom found in American and most British hospitals. "They're really well and lots of fun and you can't ever get mad at them," said David. This recreation room had all the atmosphere of a fraternity house. In one corner was a radio tuned to a jazz program. Around a small fireplace lounged six young doctors, just in their twentees, dressed in old
