On the return trip tickets will be accepted until midnight, standard time, Tuesday, June 8.

REVIEW OF LOBSTER MARKET—Though this season's catch of lobsters in the Tignish-Alberton area will not be as great as last year, the overall total for the Province will be greater than last year's catch, according to Mr. J. J. Larabee, Dominion Department of Fisheries, Charlottetown. Mr. Larabee reports that some canneries in the western section of the Province are laying off some of their factory help due to the scarcity of lobsters at the present time. Island canners are reported to be paying from 15 to 16 cents a pound for canned lobsters while some New Brunswick canners are offering the Island fishermen 20 cents a pound. The result is that a considerable quantity of canned lobsters are being trucked to the mainland. Large lobsters, formerly very plentiful in the North Cape area, are now unusually scarce. On the other hand, it is reported that large lobsters constitute a large percentage of those taken on the South side.

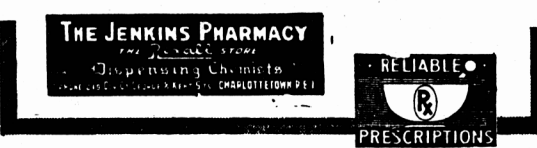
