Mr. Murdock Stated For the Discard

OTTAWA, April 3.—Mr. Murdock, the Minister of Labor, was today both repudiated and humiliated by his colleagues. At the close of last Thursday's debate on the Nova Scotia mining trouble, Mr. Fielding, brushing aside the Labor Minister's whole case, promised the House that the Gillen Commission would be received, quite regardless of any trade taken by Mr. MacLachlan alleged to be preaching sabotage. This morning, however, the Press carried the text of a telegram sent by Mr. Murdock to Robert Baxter, Glace Bay, in which the Minister of Labor, challenging Mr. Fielding's promise, declared that the reconvening of the Board of investigation depended upon a satisfactory statement from Mr. Baxter that "striking on the job" would be repudiated and discontinued. Mr. Murdock's message, directly opposed to Mr. Fielding's promise to the House and, in its implications, shattering the whole theory of collective Cabinet re-ment, or if either does," Mr. Fielding, clearly annoyed, with the House witnessed such a parliamentary circus as has not been by other way cut, absolutely repudiated by the Prime Minister, and the matter was the subject of considerable speculation. In some quarters, there are even whispers that Mr. Murdock will not be long in the Cabinet; that his mis-handling of the Nova Scotia Mining case, coupled with the fiasco of his estimates on Friday last, has convinced old-timers, like Mr. Fielding, that he is temperamentally unfitted for the task of a Minister.

Montreal Weekly Market Letter

The receipts of live stock of the two markets for the week ending March 10th, amounted to 500 cattle, 3004 calves, 175 sheep and lambs, and 3167 pigs. In addition there were 455 cattle of through billing for export.

With only 600 head on the two markets this week following last week's light run trading was fairly active at prices 25 cents or more, in some cases higher than last week. This slight improvement has been for some time past. For the last few weeks out-lets packers have been setting their surplus beef here almost regardless of price. It is reported that one local packer bought last week a considerable quantity of dressed beef from some packer who is a competitor for the local beef trade. When one company sells to a competitor, it is an almost sure sign that the local market is out of line.

The top for 5000 steers was \$15 paid for a small lot of good bred steers averaging around 1000 pounds. Another small lot would not grade as good, brought \$8.00. Nice handy butcher cattle brought from \$7.00 to \$7.50 while those of only plain to medium quality sold from \$6.00 to \$6.75. Very plain light steers and heifers as low as \$4.50. Good cows sold well. In one or two cases brought as high as \$6.50 but \$6.00 was the general top for good cows. Fat shelly old cows brought from \$5.00 to \$5.50. Medium plain cows sold from \$4.00 to \$5.00, plain thin dairy cows brought from \$2.00 to \$3.99 and canners from \$1.50 to \$2.00. The bulls offered were not of a particularly good class. There were quite a few heavy plainish Western bulls. An odd individual brought up as high as \$5.75, but \$5.00 to \$5.50 took the bulk. Good fleshy bulls brought from \$4.00 to \$4.75 and the plain kinds around \$3.50 with a few light ones as low as \$2.00.

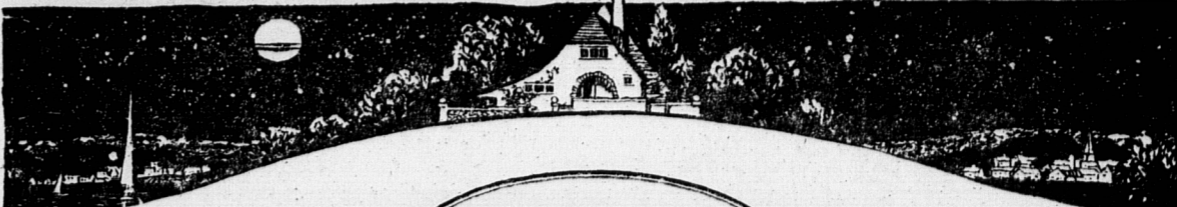
The receipts of calves showed quite a falling from last week, being almost 25 per cent less than last week. The falling off in receipts did not check the downward trend of prices. A few picked lots brought \$7.00 to a little better, but the bulk of the calves sold from \$6.00 to \$6.50 with the common thin lots down as low as \$5.00.

Sheep and lambs were unchanged. Lambs brought from \$10.00 to \$11.00, and the sheep around \$7.00.

Hogs opened strong to 25 cents up from last week's close. On Monday the prevailing price was \$14.50 to \$14.75. Later in the day a few lots of long cut selects touched \$15.00. At the close of the week hogs were easier and the most of the sales for short run hogs was made at \$14.50. Some were weighed out at \$3.00 and stags \$6.00, less than trade. It is more than likely that hogs will be lower next week, probably around \$13.50.

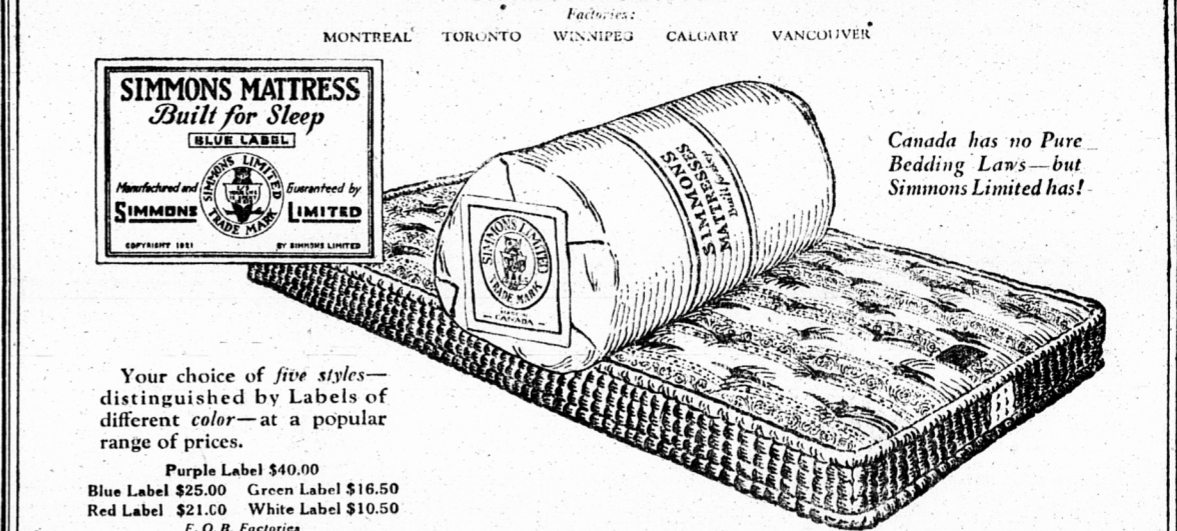
