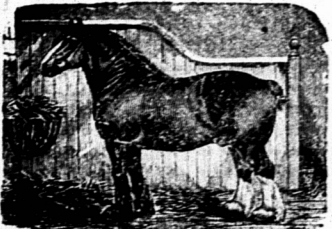

MUCH UNCLAIMED MONEY LIES IN BRITISH BANKS

Strange though it may seem to some, there are many thousands of pounds lying unclaimed in British banks. In some countries it is compulsory for bankers to publish particulars of these dormant accounts, but the rule does not hold here.

There have been several instances where a woman—for this happens less frequently in the case of men—has saved up a nice little sum and deposited it in the bank, without saying a word about it to her relatives. Perhaps she hides the receipts in some secure place, and at her death, if she leaves no will, no one knows the existence of the money.

Other unclaimed accounts are due to a misapprehension on the part of depositors. They lose their receipts and imagine that they cannot claim the money without them.

Yet another class must be set down to sheer neglectfulness. The depositor adds up the amount of the cheques he has drawn, and calculating that there is nothing further owing him, he imagines his account to be closed. He may have neglected the interest given by some banks on current accounts.—T.H.B.
