PLATOON FOR CHARLOTTETOWN.—Recently instructions were given for this province to send recruits for garrison duty in Halifax and representations were made that the province was entitled to retain a proportion of the men here. As a result permission has been granted; for a platoon to be retained here including one lieutenant, two sergeants, three corporals and a total of 31 men. It is probable that Lieut. McCarthy, M. C. will be in command.

THE MILITARY MEDAL has been awarded to the late Lance Corporal J. H. McAssey, son of Mrs. David McAssey of Mount Stewart. According to the London Gazette, this medal was awarded on account of the great bravery and devotion to duty of Corporal McAssey near Avion on the night of the 28th and 29th November 1917 during an enemy raid. He showed much courage in exposing himself while throwing grenades at the attacking enemy and afterwards rushed out after the retreating foe and continued to fire upon them. The medal has been received here and will be formally presented by the Lieutenant Governor to the gallant soldier's mother.

RETURNED SOLDIER'S COMMITTEE.—A meeting of the Returned Soldier's Committee was held in the Provincial Building Monday when the different sub committees reported on the organization throughout the province. It was intimated that the Secretary of the Land Settlement Board intends to visit the province at an early date and open an office here. As soon as this is done publicity will be given to the proposals of the Government with reference to the settlement of returned soldiers on the land. Additional legislation making the terms of borrowing more favourable than hitherto will be introduced at the next session of the legislature.
