Sunday School Convention at West Devon Etc.

Quite a large number of Sunday School workers assembled in Convention in the Methodist church at West Devon on Tuesday afternoon last (Aug. 6). The President Rev. A. H. Whitman of O'Leary conducted the devotional service, after which the Secretary, W. E. Brooks, read the minutes of last Convention.

Many encouraging verbal reports were given by the delegates. Some schools had succeeded in raising all the year. Others had organized Home Departments.—The reports indicated increased interest along many lines, and all felt that considerable advancement had been made since the last meeting of the Convention.

A paper was then read by Rev. A. H. Whitman, on the subject, "The teacher's relation to his class." This paper was prepared by J. Newton Wilkinson of Alberton, and was an excellent exposition of the subject.

The provincial Field Secretary addressed the Convention along general lines of S.S. work and expressed pleasure at the marked signs of improvement as indicated by the reports.—Many questions were asked and answered which added greatly to the profit and interest of the meeting.

EVENING SESSION.

A large audience came together at the evening meeting. Devotional service was conducted by Rev. Pepper. R. W. Officers were then elected in open convention by motion as follows.

President, Rev. A. H. Whitman. Vice President, Henry Ritchie. Sec-Treasurer, W. E. Brooks.

Additional members of the Executive Committee A. G. Campbell, Rev. R. W. Pepper and A. Matheson.

Mr. George Ritchie, superintendent of the Grace Methodist Sunday School of Charlottetown was present and in response to an invitation from the president addressed the convention, giving some experience in managing a school, and showing how difficulties were successfully overcome.

An address was then given by Rev. R. W. Pepper, who has recently entered upon the pastorate of West Cape Circuit. He strongly emphasized the necessity of temperance training in the school. He hoped that the day was not far distant when temperance work would come more under the control of the church, and all Sunday School scholars would take the temperance pledge.

The remainder of the time was occupied by the Field Secretary. In connection with his evening address he used the blackboard freely, and showed by his illustrations how "things seen are mightier than things heard." He said as Sunday School workers we are gathered in the interest of the home, the church, and the state. His remarks could not fail to be stimulating to all Sunday School workers.

The convention closed to meet again at a time and place to be arranged by the Executive committee.

AUGUST 11. GOD'S PROMISE TO ABRAHAM. Gen. 15:1-18. Memory verses 5-7

GOLDEN TEXT. I am thy shield; and thy exceeding great reward.—Gen. 15:1.

1. The Promise of the Life that Now is v. 1-6.

LESSON HELPS.

1. "After these things"—After rescuing his friends and neighbors. As he had befriended others, God would now befriend him. "In a vision"—And when he was awake. God called him by name and says "Fear not," lest he might fear that the four kings he had routed might rally and attack him. "Thy shield"—A most expressive military figure; of use to ward off attacks. "Thy reward"—The presence and love of God are sufficient reward.

2. "What wilt thou give me, seeing I go childless"—Children were prized, and they were called a heritage of the Lord. Apart from that, the question arose how the promise could be to his descendants if none were born to him. It seemed a pity that the blessing should come to servants only. Abraham had wealth enough, but the glory of a family was what he desired.

3. "We have God's gracious answer to his complaint. There is here the promise of a son. God was better to him than his fears, and added the promise that his dependants shall be as the stars, first in number, then in glory."

4. "He believed in the Lord"—It took great faith in the power of God for him to do so. The promise did not then seem likely to be fulfilled. His faith is spoken of with praise by New Testament writers. "He counted it to him for righteousness"—He was accepted of God as a righteous man, and he had the witness of his acceptance.

5. "I am the Lord"—And that fact ought to be enough to inspire confidence. "Brought the out of Ur of the Chaldees"—Out of a land of idolatry and persecution. What has been done is a pledge and promise of what will be done.

6. "To give thee this land"—The purpose of bringing out of one land was to bring into another.

7. "Whereby shall I know"—Abraham

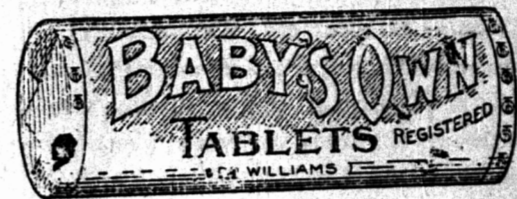
