NAVY FACED—An increase of 22 per cent, despite a much shorter period of time.

The big reason for this increase has been Germany's possession of submarine bases from Norway to Spain along the western seaboard of Europe since the collapse of France. This has enabled her to add hundreds of miles to their range and in addition has permitted the use of small submarines which could not operate from more distant bases.

It is believed some Italian submarines may have escaped through the Straits of Gibraltar to work in co-operation with German underwater craft in the Atlantic.

It is probable the Germans have discovered the secrets of the Asdic submarine detector, with which all British naval vessels are equipped. It has been suggested the Germans gained their knowledge after the collapse of France, probably by examining the Asdic on some French naval vessels.

Despite her losses, Britain has almost as much shipping as when the war started, due to a big building program and charters of vessels from other nations. But no attempt is made to disguise the fact Britain is short of merchant ships.

With German warship loose on the Atlantic, presumably the Admiral Scheer probably operating from some Norwegian port, the work of the navy becomes more dangerous. Not only must strong naval units be diverted to track and track down the 11-inch gun vessel but numerous stronger escorts must be provided for North Atlantic convoys.
