MANITOBA ELECTION

WINNIPEG, Man., July 6.—The last week of the political battle has been entered upon with expressions of confidence on both sides. T. C. Norris, Opposition leader, after touring the province last week, declared on his return here, "there is nothing to be changed on July 10th," and issued a manifesto to the electors emphasizing the certainty of victory if the polls are protected election day.

"The machine," he said, "is desperate. I feel it will stop at nothing."

The Conservatives are leaving nothing to chance and the Cabinet Ministers are assisted by Hon. Messrs. Rogers and Roche, of the Federal Cabinet. Many meetings are being planned for the closing days in the city and province.

The Telegram, Conservative, asserts that the Government will win by an overwhelming majority. The Telegram this morning accuses Dr. D. G. Shorthead, Liberal candidate in Gilbert Plains, of having taken away eight ballots from the printing office in Gilbert Plains and says constables have been sent after him to demand their return.
