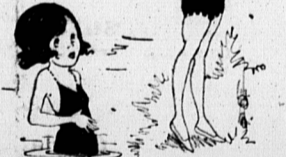

ROVERS ARE CITY LEAGUE CHAMPIONS

By Defeating The Anchors In The Deciding Game Last Evening By a Score Of 5-3 They Clinched The City League Pennant And The Governor Heartz Trophy.

All streets lead to the Abegweit grounds last evening, when the final game of the City League Baseball League was being held between the Anchors and Rovers, as to the outcome of the game, every person was of a different opinion, but they generally agreed that it would be a game well worth watching. 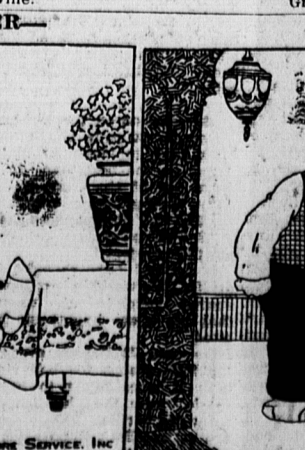

LAMBTON GOLF CLUB, Toronto, Aug. 3—Leo Diegel equalled the record of the late J. Douglas Edgar of Atlanta, Ga., by winning his second consecutive Canadian Open Golf Championship Saturday, when he finished with 295, two shots better than Mike Brady, of Marmaroneck, while Andy Kay, of Lambton, and Walter Hagen, of Pasadena, Fla., tied for third place with 301.

Kay lost his chance by poor putting while Hagen had his drives out of bounds on the first and 17th holes and it was the first hole that spoiled Hagen's chances as he took an eight. Kay went good until the fourteenth and on that hole the sixteenth and eighteenth he failed to sink comparatively easy putts which put him out of the running. The big match was followed by a huge gallery.

FREDERICTON, N.
