S. S. "MAGNHLID" IN PORT—The S. S. "Magnhlid" Capt. Clausen arrived in port early Saturday morning and loaded 2,500 bags of potatoes at the Railway Wharf. Capt. Clausen reports meeting heavy ice on the passage from Halifax, which port he left on Wednesday morning. Reaching Canoe the ship became jammed and they were compelled to back the heavy tug until Friday morning. To clear the ice it was found necessary to pursue a course up St. George's Bay at times being only a half mile off shore. After passing Cape George they left the troublesome ice astern. The weather was clear until Friday morning, when it became overcast. The crew of the ship has practically the same crew this season. After completing loading at the Railway Wharf the ship returned to Buntain and Bell's wharf to take on the following cargo: 100 head of cattle; 30 horses; 10 tons of hay; 300 bags of potatoes and upwards of 200 crates of pigs, large and small. When loading operations are completed the steamer will sail for St. Pierre and Newfoundland.
