EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the 37th week of the contest, ending July 16, 1924.

There was a falling off of 15 eggs in the Contest during the past week, the total number laid was 802, the total to date 24,263. The highest hen to date is No. 123, a White Leghorn owned by the Experimental Station. Her total production to date is 192 eggs.

Seventeen hens have laid over 165 eggs. Pen No. 13 led the contest for the week, and passed No. 14 for first place in the contest; Mr. Samuel McPherson's White Leghorns were second, with 50 eggs; Mrs. Frank Halliday's Barred Rocks were third, with 49 eggs; Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns tied with Mrs. Edward Bullpitt's White Leghorns for fourth place with 48 eggs each; the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 14 was fifth, with 44 eggs; the Station's pen of Leghorns No. 15 was sixth, with 42 eggs; Mr. Augustine Wisner's White Wyandottes tied with the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns No. 12 for seventh place with 40 eggs each.

The Experimental Station's pens of Leghorns Nos. 13, 14, 12 and 15 were first, second, third and fourth in the contest, with 1544, 1543, and 1330 eggs respectively; Mr. Samuel McPherson's White Leghorns were fifth with 1314 eggs; Mr. Edward Bullpitt's White Leghorns were sixth, with 1311 eggs; Mrs. Frank Halliday's Barred Rocks were seventh, with 1293 eggs; Mr. J. J. McGillivray's White Leghorns were eighth, with 1290 eggs; and Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns were ninth, with 1256 to date.
