By the death of Mrs. Robert McFar of Clifton, New London on the 22nd of Feb. last, her husband lost a dutiful and affectionate wife, her children a kind and self denying mother, the Presbyterian Church and W. F. Missionary Society a loyal and generous member, and the community one whose whole life was spent in Clifton and was universally esteemed and beloved.

The sudden death at Summerside about 11 a. m. yesterday from alcoholic poisoning of Annie Richard created a little excitement about town. Deceased returned to Summerside last fall from Duluth, Minn. where he had been for some years. During the present winter he had been employed temporarily shovelling snow on the P. E. I. R. For the past week or more he is said to have been drinking and, as was brought out in the evidence at the Coroner's inquest yesterday afternoon, had on different days purchased from two of the Summerside drug stores quantities of alcohol and methylated spirits. According to the evidence of his wife he had been ill in bed all day Wednesday and after drinking some alcohol in the house told Mrs. Richard that he was poisoned and was going to die. Other witnesses who had been in his company ever since Sunday swore they had drunk alcohol with him. The druggists gave testimony having sold deceased alcohol and methylated spirits believing them as deceased had stated to be for medicinal purposes. Dr. McLellan in giving evidence stated that he was called to home of deceased at 10 a. m. yesterday and found him in a case of collapse and concluded it was a case of poisoning. Finding the case serious he called in another physician. A post mortem in his opinion would not reveal any more definite proof. The verdict of the jury was "that the deceased Annie Richard came to his death by drinking alcohol and methylated spirits taken by himself through ignorance of its effects and we would strongly recommend that more discretion be used by the druggists in the indiscriminate sale of all poisonous cordials including alcohol and methylated spirits." Deceased was 40 years of age and leaves a wife and three children.

CHILD INSTANTLY KILLED

TORONTO, March 13.—While having a game of tag with several of his little playmates, Charles Harold Beasley, five years old, was struck and instantly killed by a car within a few yards of his home, shortly after six p. m. Monday.
