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PRINCE EDWARD THEATRE

Such a galaxy of histrionic stars we never before engaged in any cinematograph production as the incomparable actors and actresses who are now being seen in "The Diamond from the Sky," the moving picture serial which has far outclassed the best of its predecessors and taken the theatre-going world by storm. The first installment was shown at the Prince Edward Theatre on Monday before last, and yesterday the second number was presented to large houses. Two of the leading ladies in the cast are the famous Lottie Pickford, as Esther and Charlotte Burton, as Vivian Marston. The story in brief, as far as it has gone, is this: A bitter feud exists between Col. Arthur Stanley and his cousin, Judge Lamar Stanley, of Virginia. It is aggravated by the death of an English ancestor, which makes the eldest male child of the Virginia Stanleys heir to an English Earldom and to a massive jewel "The Diamond from the Sky" which was connected with the adventures of a member of the Stanley family in Virginia some centuries before. At the birth of a daughter Colonel Stanley plots kidnapping and buys the male baby of a gypsy

king, planning to rear his daughter in secrecy. But Hagar, the gypsy mother, steals Esther Stanley, the daughter together with "the diamond from the sky" and a sealed document. Years later Hagar, repentant, brings Esther back and gives her to Dr. Lee, her parents having died. Arthur Stanley 2nd, (the false heir) and the Judge's son, Blair Stanley, both fall in love with her. Blair Stanley steals the diamond and in so doing kills Dr. Lee. The end of the second chapter sees Blair escaping from the scene of his murder, "who gets the Diamond from the Sky?" is the question which is to be answered. This serial is unquestionably the best ever shown at any picture house, and the management of the Prince Edward is to be commended on having an uncommonly good feature. In the succeeding chapters there will be sensational developments. "The Locked Door," a three reel feature combined pleasure with education and was a rarely good picture. The picture was taken in co-operation with the Fire Department of New York City and was highly recommended by the Chief of the Fire Prevention Commission. The latest devices in use in combating the fire door were shown in "The Locked Door" such, for example, as automatic sprinklers. The moment a fire starts in a room there is a shower which effectually quenches it. The picture teaches an important lesson, while it is presented in the form of a drama, thus being doubly interesting. "The Hazards of Helen" installment was unusually exciting and kept the audience on tenter-hooks throughout. The comedy provided twenty minutes of merry laughter.

FIGHT FOR CZARTORYSK STILL CONTINUES

Mr. Archibald, referred incidentally to St. Dunstons Cathedral, which he said is one of the best buildings of the kind in the Maritime Provinces and of which the citizens might well be proud. He also spoke in highly complimentary terms to the residence of Messrs Aitken and Ivan Redford remarking on the attractiveness of the residence.
