S., and will spend a week here conducting training classes, etc. to which all interested are welcome.

Miss Atwood arrived in Summerside Tuesday evening, and is conducting classes there Wednesday and Thursday. While in Summerside she is to be the guest of Mrs. Maurice Mill.

Friday, Saturday and Monday evenings at 7.45 p.m. Miss Atwood will conduct Brownie training classes in Charlottetown. These meetings will be held at the home of Mrs. Harry Oudmore, 113 North River Road.

While on the Island, she will also visit and inspect, insofar as possible, all organized Brownie Packs. In addition to conducting training classes and visiting Packs, Miss Atwood is to be the guest speaker at the annual Girl Guide meeting to be held at the Charlottetown Hotel next Wednesday, April 27th, at 12.45 p.m. Any person wishing to hear this outstanding speaker will be given the opportunity of doing so by attending the above mentioned annual meeting.

Glowing reports of Miss At-

wood's outstanding ability have been pouring in to Provincial Headquarters from various points where she has concluded training courses.

Miss Atwood comes here from Dominion Headquarters, Toronto. She was born in England, where she was enrolled as a Girl Guide and did five years of Brownie work before coming to Canada. She has worked in Toronto for twelve years with children from nursery school age up to thirteen years of age. She holds an Ontario teacher's Certificate as well as a Nursery School Certificate. Most of her Brownie work has been done in Ontario, and it was there she qualified as an Eagle Owl Diploma Guide, the highest award for which a Guide may qualify. As such, she is enabled to hold throughout Canada courses for training Guides and prospective Guides in Brownie work.

Complaints of Illness As Smog Test Proceeds

DONORA, Pa., April 20 — (AP) — Hoarse complaints of sore throats and lack of breath today followed the start of a four-day test of smoke conditions similar to those of last October's fatal smog.

Opinion was almost unanimous by Webster — across the Monongahela river from Donora — that the current effort to duplicate industrial conditions of last October's tragedy was succeeding "too well."

While smog-wary residents across the river voiced their complaints, authorities in this sprawling mill community said they had received no reports of illness caused by the smoke conditions.

A prevailing westerly wind whisked the white clouds pouring from the American Steel and Wire Company's zinc plant away from the city and directly into Webster. Towering hills — below which the town is clustered — trapped the smoke and left it hanging lazily over the frame houses.

Occasionally the wind shifted, and the smoke-borne gloom vanished.

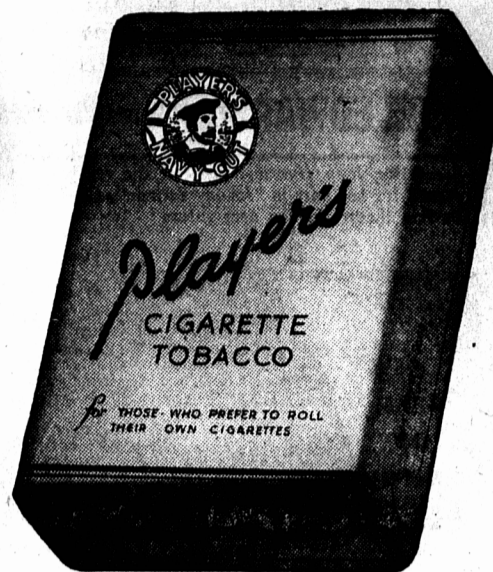

Johns-Manville Back In Partial Production

ASBESTOS, Que., April 20 — (CP) — Mill No. 4, a small segment of Canadian Johns-Manville Company's works, began operations today for the first time since 5,000 asbestos workers in the Eastern Townships went on strike Feb. 13 demanding a 16-cent-an-hour increase.

Company spokesmen said between 200 and 300 men were at work in the plant which normally employs 2,100.

Meantime the strike throughout the "serpentine belt" of the Eastern Townships which produces some 80 per cent of the world's asbestos continued firm among members of the Asbestos Workers' Syndicate, affiliated with the Canadian Catholic Confederation of Labor.

Their reply to a radio broadcast by Labor Minister Barrette in which he reiterated his conten-

tion that the strike is illegal and said the men should return to work was to send him a wire demanding his resignation.

To this the minister made no comment. In Asbestos last night some 2,000 workers jammed a church hall and were told by two parish priests that "the church will soon do something about the strike—and we'll show you that when the church strikes it strikes hard."

Both company and union officials announced their intention to hold out although admitting that week-end talks in Quebec revealed that Monsignor Maurice Roy, Archbishop of Quebec was "very anxious" to see the strike end.

Strikers' funds and food supplies are being eaten into daily but union officials said help coming into the strike area from outside unions is sufficient "to see us through."

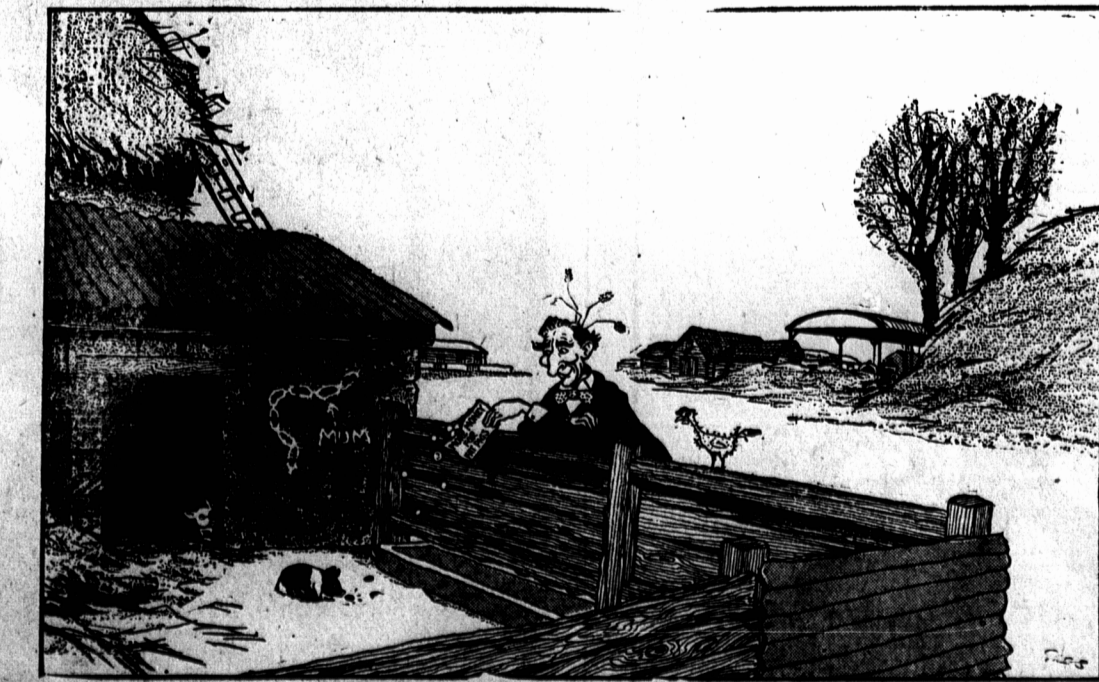
